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An Atmosphere of Faith

Dear Brethren and Friends,

What a *magnificent* Feast of Tabernacles God gave us this year! As mentioned in my member letter, many felt this year's Feast was the "most inspirational" ever! Read for yourselves some of the detailed reports on the Feast in this issue and perhaps some in the next issue as well. Your encouraging and inspiring letters about the Feast are still coming in.

During the Feast, my sermons mainly touched on the twin themes of "Restoring Apostolic Christianity" and building an "atmosphere of FAITH" within God's Church. I hope and pray that all of you are picking up on these themes—and that you will *pray* about them, and really *study* the Bible so as to be very conversant with these vital themes. After all, this is nothing new. It is exactly what we see reflected in the book of Acts and in the history and writings of the early Apostolic Church. *This approach is what we ought to be imitating!* Yet it is encouraging and inspiring to realize that—if we do our part—God will no doubt begin to "pour out" His Spirit on us as He did the early Church of God. For, as we know, "Jesus Christ is the SAME yesterday, today, and forever" (Hebrews 13:8).

Remember the atmosphere of constant prayer and SEEKING GOD that is described throughout the book of Acts? Soon after Christ ascended to heaven, we read of the Apostles: "These all continued with one accord in prayer and supplication, with the women and Mary the mother of Jesus, and with His brothers" (Acts 1:14). "Supplication," of course, has the connotation of *very humble* and *heartfelt prayer!* Mr. Armstrong used to tell us that he felt one of the greatest LACKS in the prayers of God's people in this age is that all too often we do NOT put our "hearts" into our prayers. We do not have the dynamic earnestness and PASSION of those who are truly "crying out" to the Great GOD!

Please think about it.

Again, notice the constant atmosphere of prayer even among the new converts in the early church: "Then those who gladly received His word were baptized; and that day about three thousand souls were added to them. And they continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in PRAYERS" (Acts 2:41–42).

Notice this powerful prayer to God by the Church when some of the Apostles' lives had been threatened: "And being let go, they went to their own companions and reported all that the chief priests and elders had said

to them. So when they heard that, they raised their voice to God with one accord and said: 'Lord, You are God, who made heaven and earth and the sea, and all that is in them.... Now, Lord, look on their threats, and grant to Your servants that with all boldness they may speak Your word, by stretching out Your hand to heal, and that signs and wonders may be done through the name of Your holy Servant Jesus'" (Acts 4:23–24; 29–30). In this case, the answer came quickly and God literally SHOOK the building in which the brethren were meeting!

But notice what the early Church of God people asked for: boldness in preaching, and that God would grant signs and wonders and HEALINGS to back up the preaching of His Word. And God began to answer DRAMATICALLY in a number of ways, including the Apostles' performing many signs and wonders and even Peter's "shadow" causing people to be HEALED! (Acts 5:12–16).

When it came time to call the first Gentile to conversion, Peter was sent to a Roman captain who was a "devout man" who "prayed always" (Acts 10:2), and who had been FASTING for about four days (v. 30). *This* is the kind of man whose prayer God hears!

In our day, God mightily used Herbert W. Armstrong because of this same type of attitude and zealous approach to God. In his autobiography, Mr. Armstrong describes a time when he was financially impoverished, when his wife was about to have a baby while at the *same time* she had developed a severe case of anemia and other complications. What did Mr. Armstrong do? His answer is contained in the following quote from the *Autobiography of Herbert W. Armstrong*, Vol. 1, pp. 391–393:

There was no more time to lose. I *had* to find the answer. I knew of only one way. *Fasting* and prayer! It was the last-ditch resort. I didn't know how one ought to fast and pray—I had never done it before. But when Jesus' disciples were unable to cast out a demon, Jesus said such a result came only by fasting and prayer. So I began to fast.

The fasting was begun on a Sabbath morning. That morning I ate no breakfast. Not knowing *how* one ought to go about fasting and prayer, I first prayed and asked God to show me the way—to open my understanding. Then, since God speaks to us through His written Word, I began to search the Bible for instruction about fasting. For one hour with the aid of a concordance I studied passages of Scripture on the subject of fasting and praying, much of the time on my knees.

Then for one hour I sat in thought and contemplation. I turned over in my mind the scriptures I had read. I reflected on my own life in recent months. I tried to compare it with God's way, as revealed in the Scriptures. Then I spent the next hour in talking to God—in prayer.

And so I decided to continue in this order—one hour in scripture study, one in contemplation, and one in prayer. I did not once ask God to heal my wife—as yet. I had been doing that for weeks, without result. I was fasting and praying, not for the purpose of bringing pressure on God to force Him to

mong the many splits and divisions of God's people in the past several years, one troubling theme seems to be springing up again and again. That theme or concept is that "the Work is over," or that "we don't need to do a Work except merely to feed the flock."

This idea should seem almost incomprehensible to one who deeply drinks in of what the Bible clearly says. Yet some very misguided individuals seem bent on denigrating the zeal we all should have to "finish the Work." Consider carefully the Great Commission which Jesus Christ gave to His followers: "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the END of the age" (Matthew 28:19-20). Jesus said He would be "with" us in doing this Work until the END of the age.

Has the "end" come? Of course not! Did Jesus ever *modify* this statement to tell us to keep preaching the Gospel to "all nations" only until Peter died? Or until the Apostle Paul died? Or until Herbert W. Armstrong died? Again, *of course not!*

Rather, every single indication in the Bible about our Christian responsibility tells us that God's *true* servants will continue to preach and publish the Gospel to the nations until they are physically stopped and kept from doing so. In an obviously prophetic commission, Jesus told His disciples, "And you will be hated by all for My name's sake. But he who endures to the end will be saved. When they per-

secute you in this city, flee to another. For assuredly, I say to you, you will not have gone through the cities of Israel before the Son of Man comes" (Matthew 10:22–23). In a prophecy pertaining to the years just ahead of us, Jesus said, "Then they will deliver you up to tribulation and kill you, and you will be hated by all nations for My name's sake" (Matthew 24:9).

Were we "hated" by ALL nations in the Work Christ did through Mr. Armstrong with many of us participating? *Of course not!* Because, in fact, most nations did not even know that we existed as a church. And Mr. Armstrong personally made brief "protocol visits" to a number of world leaders and was very warmly received with NO persecution whatever!

In our Work today, the little groups of God's scattered people are virtually UNKNOWN to nearly all the nations. They do not hate us because they do not even know that we exist!

Yet, clearly speaking of His Second Coming, Jesus described how we would have to flee from persecution and said, "You will not have gone through the cities of Israel before the Son of Man comes." This surely indicates that we would at least be TRYING to go through all "the cities"—publicly preaching and publishing Christ's Message to the END of this age.

Definitely speaking of this END-time when the "abomination of desolation" is to appear, Daniel writes, "The people who know their God shall be strong, and carry out great exploits. The people who understand shall instruct many; yet for many days they shall fall by sword and flame, by captivity and plundering" (Daniel 11:31–33). We who do truly know God and understand His will have both the opportunity and the respon-

sibility to proclaim Christ's Message to the nations of this deceived world!

Turning our churches into virtual social clubs, trying to mainly feed ourselves and be with our friends in a comfortable environment is NOT God's will. For this coming Holocaust will be the time of the GREATEST national tribulation in human history. And it is *definitely* coming primarily upon the "house of Joseph"—the American and British-descended peoples all around the world.

At such a time, what are we COM-MANDED to be doing? God answers His true Church who should understand: "But if the watchman sees the sword coming and does not blow the trumpet, and the people are not warned, and the sword comes and takes any person from among them, he is taken away in his iniquity; but his blood I will require at the watchman's hand. So you, son of man: I have made you a WATCHMAN for the house of Israel; therefore you shall hear a word from My mouth and WARN THEM for Me" (Ezekiel 33:6–7).

Do *you* want to have the responsibility for the BLOOD of thousands or millions of people on your hands because you tried to reason around the responsibility we have been given?

Sabbath-keeping ministers who try to kid themselves and their followers that there is "no Work to be done" are in for a rude awakening! Those so confused that they cannot remember what God's Apostle, Herbert W. Armstrong, taught, or somehow do not grasp the special responsibility we have to warn the "house of Israel," should consider God's inspired warning about ANY type of Holocaust coming upon a national peoples: "If you faint in the day of adversity, your strength is small. Deliver those who are drawn toward death, and hold

back those stumbling to the SLAUGHTER [Great Tribulation!]. If you say, 'Surely we did not know this,' does not He who weighs the hearts consider it? He who keeps your soul, does He not know it? And will He not render to each man according to his deeds?" (Proverbs 24:10–12).

Despite any real or imagined faults, Herbert W. Armstrong was the human leader in God's Church whom God used very powerfully for 52 years. He *always* taught us that the heart of any true Christian should be in "the Work." He always said that most people grow spiritually according to *how much* their heart was in getting Christ's Message to others—to the *whole world!*

Just before his death a few days later, Mr. Armstrong wrote his final co-worker letter on January 10, 1986. Notice what God's Apostle wrote:

Dear Brethren and Co-Workers, This is my first letter to you in 1986, and could very well be my last. Now in my ninety-fourth year I am in a very physically weakened state enduring severe pain and with virtually no strength whatsoever. I briefly described my condition in last month's Co-Worker letter to you, and now it has worsened. It may be that the work God has given me to do is complete, but not the Work of God's Church, WHICH WILL BE FAITH-FULLY DOING WORK [emphasis ours] till Christ, the True Head of this Church, returns....

Remember, brethren, this is not the work of Herbert W. Armstrong, nor will it be the work of Mr. Tkach, or any man. It is the Work of the Living Creator, God. You are supporting this

Work of God, and it is the Great God who will pour out His blessings on you for your generosity. Continue to sacrifice through 1986 to finish the commission God has given His Church. The GREATEST WORK [emphasis ours] lies yet ahead.

Then consider what Jesus Christ said, "My food is to do the will of Him who sent Me, and to finish His work. Do you not say, 'There are still four months and then comes the harvest?' Behold, I say to you, lift up your eyes and look at the fields, for they are already white for harvest! And he who reaps receives wages, and gathers fruit for eternal life, that both he who sows and he who reaps may rejoice together" (John 4:34–36).

Finally, let us never forget the inspired statement of Daniel referring specifically to the time of the END. Daniel wrote, "Those who are wise shall shine like the brightness of the firmament, and those who TURN MANY to righteousness like the stars forever and ever" (Daniel 12:3). As most Bible commentaries acknowledge, the Hebrew expression "turn many" has the connotation of "evangelism"-of "doing a Work," of bringing in NEW believers and NOT merely "feeding the flock." As the Expositor's Bible Commentary, states regarding Daniel 12:3:

"The parallel expression is those who lead many to righteousness. The fruit of a Christ-centered, godly life is NEW BELIEVERS, won to the Lord through God's servants. The Good Shepherd rejoices to see His sheep brought home to Him through faithful soul winners. Such 'will shine... like the stars for ever and ever (Vol. 7, p. 152)."

Those of you who may have been called after 1965, or any year, where would you have learned the Truth if the people and the leadership of God's

Church had decided that the Work was done in 1960? What if they had gotten off radio or if they had never gone on television? And had ceased to publish the *Plain Truth* magazine? Are we now to say that because we have the truth about salvation, taught us by others, we no longer have a responsibility to continue spreading the Truth of God? I think you know the answer is we DO have that responsibility.

God's special blessing is on those who are willing to *serve* and *sacrifice* so that "others"—NEW CONVERTS—may receive and have a chance to act on God's Truth and so be protected from the Great Tribulation and/or the Day of the Lord. One of the reasons we are called now is to *do this very Work*.

Brethren, Mr. Armstrong has been dead almost 14 years. An entire new generation comprised of hundreds of millions of young people all over the world is now growing up. The vast majority of them have *never* even heard of Herbert W. Armstrong. But we in the Living Church of God are the spiritual descendants of the Philadelphia Era of God's Church led by Mr. Armstrong. We are the ones to carry on the Work Christ did through Mr. Armstrong—some of us already having assisted him for many decades. Christ continues to set before us an "open door" to proclaim His powerful Gospel to the nations!

Will we have the out-flowing LOVE and CONCERN—the faith and courage—to walking continue through that "door" of evangelism as long as God gives us the opportunity? The rewards for carrying out Christ's Great Commission are AWESOME. The result of failing to zealously participate in the Great Commission is tragic-not only for the untold millions who might otherwise had been reached with the Truth, but also for those small-minded individuals who merely want to serve themselves. "He who has ears to hear, let him hear."

How Deeply Are You Committed?

ommitment runs very shallow in our modern western world.

Whether it is in marriage or in religion, most people want what is convenient and easy. What does Jesus Christ expect of those who would be His disciples? How much commitment is really necessary?

Christ warned His disciples that the time would come when many who claimed to be Christian would be offended and would hate and betray one another (Matthew 24:10). Clearly these are individuals whose commitment does not go deeply enough.

History is replete with the story of "sunshine patriots," individuals who lacked the commitment to weather personal hurts and slights or hard times that came their way. Perhaps the most infamous name in American history has been that of Benedict Arnold. His name has been paired with Judas Iscariot and is synonymous with "traitor."

Benedict Arnold did not start out as a traitor, of course. He was, in fact, the youngest American general in the Revolutionary War and a hero of some of its early engagements. He, along with many others, professed devotion to the cause of American independence, being highly thought of for putting his life on the line, and being in the forefront of action with his troops. Yet the commitment of Benedict Arnold to the ideal of an independent United States had definite limits. Those limits centered on personal ambition.

He had become increasingly angry at the actions of his superior officer, General Horatio Gates. Arnold felt that General Gates took credit for all of his good ideas and was receiving praise and recognition to which he himself was entitled. Eventually this resentment spilled over to George Washington for not seeing through General Gates, and from there to the entire American cause. Eventually Benedict Arnold made a bargain with the British to betray his colleagues and the American position at West Point, New York. In the aftermath of his sellout, his name became synonymous with "traitor."

Obviously, Benedict Arnold's commitment was shallow. He was simply not willing to tolerate what he considered unfair treatment. Christ made it very plain in Matthew 24 and other places that many Christians will become spiritual "Benedict Arnolds." What about you? How deep do your commitments run?

God's Commitment to Us

We sometimes talk about our commitment to God and to His way of life, but what about His commitment to us? Perhaps we do not often think about it in that way, but God has evidenced the deepest of commitment to you and me personally. In return, of course, He requires total commitment from us as well.

Perhaps the greatest test of commitment and obedience that God ever gave anyone was the one He gave to His friend, Abraham. Abraham was told by God to take his only legitimate son, Isaac, and go to the mountains of Moriah and there offer the young man as a sacrifice to God. Isaac was the son of Abraham and Sarah in their old age, the son for whom they had waited for decades. As much as Abraham loved his son, He loved God more. Not understanding what it was all about, yet knowing that the command came from his Creator, Abraham took young Isaac, along with the items needed for the sacrifice, and departed early the next morning. At the last possible moment, God stepped in and stopped Abraham from carrying out the sacrifice. At that point, God knew that Abraham's commitment to Him knew no bounds.

The test that God imposed on Abraham was not arbitrary. It foreshadowed what God the Father would Himself do almost twenty centuries after that event. Because, you see, God the Father gave His uniquely begotten Son, Jesus Christ, as a sacrifice to pay for the sins of all human beings. God's love for us and His commitment to our salvation knew no bounds. For our sakes, He made the supreme sacrifice!

And what about Jesus Christ, Himself? He had been in the beginning with the Father and He Himself possessed eternal power and glory. He was the very instrument of creation itself. Yet in spite of all of this, He voluntarily emptied Himself of the immortality, glory, and power that He had shared from eternity with the Father and became a mortal man. He was born as a helpless human baby and grew to adulthood in the ancient Roman provinces of Galilee and Judea.

Up and down the dusty roads He walked with His disciples, teaching and helping people. His authoritative teaching about God's way of life, and the miracles He

worked to heal and help others, brought Him into conflict with the religious establishment of His day. Growing increasingly fearful of His popularity with the masses of ordinary people, the religious leaders grew to bitterly hate and resent Jesus of Nazareth. Ultimately they collaborated to have Him arrested and turned over to the Roman government for execution by one of the cruelest means ever devised by human beings—crucifixion.

Consider the commitment that God the Father and Jesus Christ made to us personally. Paul explains in Romans 8:32 that God is so deeply concerned about each of us that He did not even spare His own Son in order to bring about our salvation. This being the case, Paul goes on to argue, how could we not expect that the Father and the resurrected Christ at His right hand would freely give us all the help we need in order to make it into the Kingdom of God? God's commitment to us is so powerful that it staggers the imagination. What about our commitment to Him? What kind of commitment does He expect of us?

In Luke 9:23, Jesus Christ is recorded as telling His disciples that if they wished to be His followers, three things were required. They would have to deny themselves, take up their cross daily, and come after Him. What did He mean by this statement? Herein lies the key to understanding the level of commitment that Christ and the Father require.

Because, make no mistake about it, there will be no fair weather disciples or "sunshine patriots" in the Kingdom of God!

Deny Yourself

The starting point of the commitment that Christ demands of those who would follow Him is self-denial. This, of course, goes against the grain of our modern Western world. People are looking for self-fulfillment, not self-denial. They are trying to "find themselves," not to lose themselves!

Popular teachers in today's world offer to help people "feel good about themselves." Often people reason that since God is love (which He is), then He certainly wants them to be happy. The next step in this train of logic is for them to conclude that whatever it is that they wish to do (in their minds, thereby making them "happy") God would surely approve. Often this may involve divorcing and remarrying without strict Biblical justification or perhaps compromising with some other standard that the Bible holds up.

Simply put, obedience to God involves self-denial. When we tithe, when we keep the Sabbath, even when we do something very physical, such as avoiding meats that

God labels unclean, we are denying physical enticements and desires as the ruling forces of our lives.

To give or help or serve others generally involves self-denial. It usually means putting off something we had wanted to do, or in some way inconveniencing ourselves because of the needs of others. It is not enough to give and serve; it must be done with a willing heart. Paul wrote the Corinthian Church about a special offering that was being collected to feed the poor brethren in Judea. He reminded them that God "loves a cheerful giver" (2 Corinthians 9:7). It is not simply what we do, but it is also the attitude in which we do it that is vital to God.

Why did God the Father and Jesus Christ deny the self in our behalf? Why did they offer such an incredible sacrifice? The motive was LOVE, outgoing concern toward us as potential future members of the Family of God. At the basis of God's character is love, and, with it, the willingness to practice self-denial to help the one loved! Christ said that if we are to come after Him we must be willing to deny the self. Understanding this concept is crucial to being a Christian.

While God's law is for our good and points the way to eternal life and joy forever, it often goes against the grain of human nature. Loving our enemies, blessing those who revile and curse us, praying for those who seek to spitefully use us—these aren't things that come naturally. To do them involves denying the natural instincts and urges that we all have.

God loves with a sacrificial love. He tells us that as future members of His family, we must also learn the way of a love that is prepared to say no to self.

Jonathan, the son of Saul, is an outstanding example of someone who exemplified true love and thereby denied the self. Most are familiar with the story told in 1 Samuel about the close friendship between Jonathan and David, the future king of Israel. After he killed Goliath, David quickly became a national hero. He went on to achieve other notable victories over the enemies of Israel. King Saul soon became consumed with jealousy because of David's popularity. In the meantime David and Jonathan became very close friends.

As Saul became more obsessively jealous of David, he began to formulate plans to kill him. Knowing of his son Jonathan's friendship with David, Saul sought to stir jealousy within his son's heart and mind. "You will never be established in your kingdom," Saul warned Jonathan, "as long as David is alive."

Jonathan, though he began to understand that his friend would undoubtedly become king instead of him, always sought to help and protect David. He denied the self and evidenced real love.

What about us? Are our minds open to jealousy and resentment of others? If they are, they are not filled with the kind of love that is prepared to deny the self!

Take Up Your Cross Daily

What did Jesus of Nazareth mean when He told His disciples that they must be prepared to take up their cross daily? Clearly, at the end of His life, He himself took up a literal cross and began the walk from the Governor's Palace to His place of execution. What is our cross and how do we take it up daily?

The stake that Jesus took up at the end of His life was symbolic of the purpose for which He had entered human flesh and come into the world. It was indeed the instrument of Christ's execution. However, it was by His death and shed blood that He paid the penalty for sin and made possible our reconciliation to God. Additionally, He triumphed over Satan and all his works, insuring the ultimate victory of all those who would follow Him.

Taking up His cross represented for Jesus Christ the shouldering of responsibility, no matter how personally distasteful. Every fiber of His being cried out for some alternate way; nevertheless, He surrendered Himself completely to the Father's perfect will (Matthew 26:39).

In speaking as He did to His disciples about taking up their cross daily, Christ showed that our responsibilities and obligations are not just one-time things. It involves matters that we must shoulder day by day. There are many distasteful and difficult obligations that we may face in our lives, and we must carry them day by day, one day at a time.

With what attitude did Jesus Christ shoulder His cross? In Luke's account we learn that a large number of people followed Him when He began the trek to Calvary, including many women who began loudly to bewail and lament what was happening to Him. He turned to them and told them that instead of weeping for Him they should weep for themselves and their children because of the terrible things that were going to come upon them and their nation (Luke 23:27–31). Christ's attitude, even at that most difficult of times personally, was one of outgoing concern for others. He shouldered His personal burden, but not with an attitude of self-pity!

How about us? With what attitude do we take up the performance of our duties and obligations day by day?

One other thing about taking up our cross; we have not failed if we find that we need some help along the way! Even Jesus received help. Because of the terrible beating that He had suffered and His subsequent loss of blood, His steps faltered and He was unable to carry His burden all the way to the top of Golgotha by Himself. Simon of Cyrene was pressed into service to help by carrying it the rest of the way. The lesson for us is that if we willingly shoulder our burdens and start on the way, the necessary help will be provided to make it to the journey's end.

Follow Me

Christ not only told us the way; He showed us the way! The essence of being a Christian is being one who follows Christ. He set us an example that we should follow in His steps (1 Peter 2:21).

After Christ's resurrection, He appeared to the Apostles on several occasions during a forty-day period. The third of these appearances occurred on the shores of the Sea of Galilee. The disciples, at the suggestion of Peter, had gone fishing. Christ appeared and ate a meal with them. Following the meal Christ strolled along the seashore with Simon Peter and began to talk to him about the martyr's death that he would eventually die. Peter's response is classic, for it illustrates the way each of us so often responds.

We learn from John 21:20–21 that Peter looked back and saw John, the beloved disciple, standing a ways off. He interrupted Christ to ask Him, "Lord, what about John? What's going to happen to him?" Christ's response to Peter is illustrative for us. "Peter, if I want him to remain alive until I come back, what is that to you? Follow you me!"

So often, like Peter, we get worried that others are going to get off more easily than we are. We get our attention on them and wonder what the future holds for them and why it may be different than for us. Christ's response to each of us is the same as that to Peter. Do not worry what I have in store for them or how I will choose to use their lives for My glory, He tells us. What we need to do is simply to concentrate on putting one foot in front of another to follow Him! Step by step and day by day, follow Jesus Christ of Nazareth.

About a week before the glorious miracle of the transfiguration, Jesus Christ emphasized to His disciples that if preserving and protecting themselves was their first priority, they would ultimately lose the very life they sought to insure. However, if they were willing to forfeit physical life for His sake, they would be rewarded with life eternal (Matthew 16:25–26).

The commitment that God the Father and our Savior Jesus Christ extended toward each of us was absolute and without reservation. The commitment that is required of us in return must also be without reservation or equivocation.

We give our utmost for His highest reward. We can do no more than that, and God will accept no less! □

Do You Have A Sense of Urgency?

hen it comes to preparing for the Kingdom of God, growing in faith and overcoming, doing the work of preaching the Gospel and warning the world—do you feel a sense of urgency? Or is your focus primarily on yourself and your own concerns—your job, your family, amusing yourself, doing your own thing by soaking up all that this world has to offer? Do real Christians need to have a sense of urgency? What does the Bible indicate?

Warnings for Us!

Today it is common to view the Scriptures as a soothing source of comfort—a place to retreat for solace when life gets difficult—and there obviously are verses for that purpose. However, the Word of God is also designed to provide instruction, correction and exhortation regarding attitudes God wants to see in future members of His family (2 Timothy 4:2). This is why biblical authors were not writing just for people who lived long ago. The Apostle Paul makes what may seem like a surprising statement about the Old Testament scriptures, "Now all these things happened to them as examples, and were written for our admonition [for our benefit as a warning], on whom the ends of the ages have come" (1 Corinthians 10:11). The Bible plainly states that even the examples in the Old Testament were recorded as a warning for us today.

One striking example is the attitude that Lot and his family exhibit-

ed as God was about to destroy the wicked city of Sodom (Genesis 19). In spite of direct warnings from God of Sodom's imminent destruction, Lot's sons-in-law laughed at the warnings. Even Lot and his wife were reluctant to leave the city. They felt no sense of urgency to get out of a rapidly deteriorating situation. Lot's earlier decision (Genesis 13:10-13) to dwell in Sodom, a city infected with wicked and perverted values, apparently tainted his judgment and his attitude. He and his family had learned to tolerate evil because it was so common. They saw no urgent reason to leave even though they were specifically warned. When Lot's wife looked back, contrary to God's instructions—apparently wishing to remain, she was turned into a pillar of salt. This sobering story is recorded for our admonition today!

The Scriptures provide numerous urgent warnings about the need to come out of this world and its ways, and those warnings apply to God's people today. Peter exhorted potential converts on the day of Pentecost to "repent, and...be baptized...be saved from this perverse [corrupt, misguided] generation" (Acts 2:40). Paul urged the church at Corinth, "Do not be unequally yoked together with unbelievers... Come out from among them and be separate" (2 Corinthians 6:14-18). The Apostle John warned those living in the last days to "come out of her [a world system modeled after the Roman Empire, dominated by a false prophet and a war-making beast], my people, lest you share in her sins, and lest you receive of her plagues" (Revelation 18:4). Do we grasp the urgency in these commands, or have we developed the same toleration of evil and complacency that infected Lot and his family?

The book of Revelation states very plainly that the last era of the Church (Laodicea) will be characterized by a similar attitude of complacency (Revelation 3:14-22). The prevailing attitude even among believers will be neither cold nor hot, just lukewarm. People will be content with the truth they possess, but without the zeal to fulfill the Great Commission given to the Church by Jesus Christ (Matthew 28:19-20, Mark 16:15-18). This is in stark contrast to the attitude of Christians Philadelphian though small in number and limited in resources, possess a real sense of urgency to preach the Gospel of the coming Kingdom of God and warn the world of the dangerous time that will precede that glorious event (Revelation 3:7-13). The Scriptures indicate that God finds this sense of determination and urgency commendable and worthy of reward. Although both Philadelphia and Laodicea believe basically the same truth, their attitudes differ significantly-as do their rewards (see Revelation 12:14–17). Those lacking a sense of urgency will not be spared from the rigors of the Tribulation. But is developing a sense of urgency really that important?

The Mind of Christ

The Apostle Paul urged the church in Philippi to develop the mind of Christ (Philippians 2:5). We see that mind reflected in statements Jesus made about his mission in life. When urged by His disciples to take a break from His ministry, Jesus responded His primary concern was to "do the will of Him who sent Me. and finish His work" because the fields were white with harvest (John 4:34–35). We see this same sense of urgency in a later response when Jesus stated, "I must work the works of Him who sent Me while it is day; the night is coming when no one can work" (John 9:4).

Jesus knew what He had to do. He knew that He had a limited "window" of opportunity—about three and onehalf years-to get the job done. His time frame was short, thus His sense of urgency. Jesus was focused, but He was not unbalanced. He urged the disciples on another occasion to rest from their busy routine (Mark 6:30-31). Jesus knew the benefits of a short change of pace. However, because of His focus on His mission and His sense of urgency, Jesus was able to say to His Father at the end of His three and one half-year ministry, "I have glorified You on the earth. I have finished the work which You have given Me to do" (John 17:4).

In developing and exhibiting this attitude of mind—this sense of urgency to get the job done—Jesus was merely following the Scriptures He had studied from childhood. Solomon had been inspired to write a thousand years earlier, "Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might" (Ecclesiastes 9:10). He also wrote, "He who deals with a slack [lazy] hand becomes poor, but the hand of the diligent [eager] makes one rich" (Proverbs 10:4; see also Proverbs 12:24). The Bible states that a person who is diligent (quick, skilled, excels)

in his work will stand before kings (Proverbs 22:29). Since the ultimate reward of Christians is to become kings and priests (leaders in the coming kingdom of God—Revelation 5:10) it is important to develop a sense of urgency to get a job done—as an example to those you will lead.

The sense of urgency that Jesus Christ exhibited is simply a manifestation of God's mind. When the disciples asked Iesus to show them the Father He replied, "He who has seen Me has seen the Father" (John 14:9). Iesus told a crowd of Iewish critics that both He and His Father had a job to do (John 5:17). The Bible indicates that God is working out a plan and purpose on this earth and that God's plan has certain time constraints. The Apostle Paul reveals that God "will finish the work and cut it short in righteousness, because the Lord will make a short work upon the earth" (Romans 9:28). Jesus indicated that God will cut short the Tribulation before man utterly destroys himself (Matthew 24:22). God the Father and Jesus Christ have a sense of urgency ingrained in their character—it is how they think and operate. This is also a quality that we need to develop as Christians—if we hope to become members of the God family.

Apostolic Admonitions

Jesus urged His disciples who would live at the end of the age "to take heed that no one deceives you. For many will come in My name...and will deceive many" (Matthew 24:4–5). The same Scriptures also urge us to watch for the appearance of specific prophesied events because "the Son of Man is coming at an hour when you do not expect Him" (Matthew 24:44).

In a letter to the church at Rome, Paul admonishes "it is high time to awake out of sleep... the night is far spent, the day is at hand. Therefore

let us cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armor of light. Let us walk properly... not in revelry and drunkenness, not in licentiousness and lewdness, not in strife and envy. But put on Iesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to fulfill its lusts" (Romans 13:11-14). Paul urged the Ephesians to "awake, you who sleep... walk circumspectly, not as fools, redeeming [using wisely] the time, because the days are evil... understand what the will of the Lord is" (Ephesians 5:14-17). He urged and exhorted the Thessalonians to avoid sexual immorality and other lusts, to be alert and be sober, to respect their leaders and be at peace with one another (1 Thessalonians 4 & 5). Paul's writings ring with urgency!

In a pastoral epistle, Paul urges Timothy to "charge them before the Lord not to strive about words to no profit...be diligent to present yourself to God, a worker who does not need to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth. But shun profane and vain babblings, for they will increase to more ungodliness" (2 Timothy 2:14-16). He further advises Timothy to "Preach the word! Be ready in season and out of season. Convince, rebuke, exhort, with all long-suffering and teaching" (2 Timothy 4:2), especially as the end of the age approaches with its prevailing sense of complacency and divisive doctrinal heresies (vv. 3-5). Paul is quite urgent in his admonitionsand these apply to our time today!

The writings of the Apostle Peter contain this same sense of urgency. Peter exhorts elders to shepherd their flocks eagerly with love and not with force or for dishonest gain if they hope to get a reward (1 Peter 5:1–5). To encourage fellow Christians to grow spiritually, Peter admonishes,

The Blessings of Third Tithe

od pronounces a blessing on those who care for the poor and needy. He also emphasizes throughout the Bible that it is the duty of the individual to closely guard, protect and support those who are afflicted within society by events and circumstances not of their choice. God identifies them as the stranger, the fatherless and the widow. "He administers justice for the fatherless and the widow, and loves the stranger, giving him food and clothing" (Deuteronomy 10:18).

From the beginning God warned society about taking advantage of those not able to defend themselves "You shall not afflict any widow or fatherless child" (Exodus 22:22). "And I will come near you for judgment; I will be a swift witness Against sorcerers, Against adulterers, Against perjurers, Against those who exploit wage earners and widows and orphans, And against those who turn away an alien-Because they do not fear Me,' Says the LORD of hosts" (Malachi 3:5). God established a system to help the poor and homeless. "You shall not pervert justice due the stranger or the fatherless, nor take a widow's garment as a pledge... When you reap your harvest in your field, and forget a sheaf in the field, you shall not go back to get it; it shall be for the stranger, the fatherless, and the widow, that the LORD your God may bless you in all the work of your hands. When you beat your olive trees, you shall not go over the boughs again; it shall be for the stranger, the fatherless, and the widow. When you gather the grapes of your vineyard, you shall not glean it afterward; it shall be for the stranger, the fatherless, and the widow" (Deuteronomy 24:17-21).

The Church of God has, as a rule, provided effectively for widows and others in need by obeying God's instruction concerning the third tithe. The basis of paying this tithe is found in the Book of Deuteronomy. "At the end of *every* third year you shall bring out the tithe of your produce of that year and store *it* up within your gates" (Deuteronomy 14:28).

For those who are financially able, the third tithe year traditionally begins and ends after the Feast of

Tabernacles in the third and sixth year of a seven-year time cycle. "When you have finished laying aside all the tithe of your increase in the third year—the year of tithing—and have given it to the Levite, the stranger, the fatherless, and the widow, so that they may eat within your gates and be filled, then you shall say before the LORD your God: 'I have removed the holy *tithe* from *my* house, and also have given them to the Levite, the stranger, the fatherless, and the widow, according to all Your commandments which You have commanded me; I have not transgressed Your commandments, nor have I forgotten *them*" (Deuteronomy 26:12–13).

Notice that God calls this tithe a "holy tithe." The Hebrew for holy is *qodesh*, and means "apartness, holiness, sacredness, separateness." This is the only place in the Bible where the tithe is so described. God places great importance on this tithe because He sets it apart for a sacred use—taking care of the Levite, the stranger, the fatherless and the widow.

God promises to bless, in a special way, those who pay the third tithe if they properly respect the concept of the tithe as being holy to God. But this blessing must be asked for upon completing the third tithe year. "I have not eaten any of it when in mourning, nor have I removed any of it for an unclean use, nor given any of it for the dead. I have obeyed the voice of the LORD my God, and have done according to all that You have commanded me. Look down from Your holy habitation, from heaven, and bless Your people Israel and the land which You have given us, just as You swore to our fathers, "a land flowing with milk and honey" (vv. 14–15).

If you have faithfully begun to observe your third tithe year after this past Feast, you can be assured that your effort is on notice before God and Jesus Christ. If you have concluded a third tithe year, do not forget to claim the blessings God will surely give because, for this past year, you cared for the Levite, the stranger, the fatherless and the widow. \Box

Go on to Perfection

very year the church concentrates its attention on understanding God's awesome plan of salvation by keeping His Holy Days.

From the Passover through the Feast of Tabernacles and the Last Great Day, Christians have been made aware that God, indeed, has a plan of salvation, and that each Holy Day is a milestone in His countdown to Christ's return. God shows His concern for His people by carefully insuring that much physical and spiritual pleasure is provided for them.

God wants Christians to know His plan of salvation. That is why on each Holy Day we ask the question "Why are we here?" This year's cycle of Holy Days is over, following one of the most challenging years the Church has faced and one of the most productive and stirring Feasts ever. The question to be asked—with all of the Holy Days behind us—what does a Christian do now?

It does not take long for Christians to realize they are back from the Feast. The world makes itself known very quickly. It is the same old job, the same old people on the job, the same old schoolmates and teachers—the carnal world and its overwhelming influence. Often, one can hardly even remember the Feast, if it were not for the photos one took. There are five more months before it all starts again with the Passover. So the question is, just what do Christians do until then?

Paul gives us a strong exhortation in the book of Hebrews. "Therefore, leaving the discussion of the elementary principles of Christ, let us go on to perfection, not laying again the foundation of repentance from dead works and of faith toward God" (Hebrews 6:1). We must go on to perfection. The Apostle Paul is

excellent or complete beyond practical or theoretical improvement." A much better definition is in the translation of the Greek word, teleiotes, having to do with intelligent, moral and spiritual perfection. To understand this we must look at the root word, teleios, defined as "a thing brought to its end, finished,

saying Christians cannot just simply rest, they must move forward in a positive manner.

God has given specialized doses of His word on each Holy Day and a concentrated dose during the Feast. It is almost as if He is allowing Christians to be alone for five months to see how they will do—testing their spiritual abilities. Throughout the Holy Days, God has fed His people. But He wants to know what they are going to do with this food during the next five months when they will have opportunity to bear fruit.

There is a need to take a closer look at this word "perfection." The Random House dictionary says: "It is the state or quality of being perfect...

wanting nothing necessary to completeness, full grown, adult, of full age, mature."

Jesus Christ said that perfection is absolutely necessary for a Christian and He provides an attainable standard for mankind. "Therefore you shall be perfect, just as your Father in heaven is perfect" (Matthew 5:48). This concept is central to the Father's love of all of mankind; a love Christians must cultivate if they are to be perfect as He is (vv. 43–45).

Perfection has one major component without which man cannot be complete. "Therefore, as the elect of God, holy and beloved, put on tender mercies, kindness, humbleness of mind, meekness, longsuffering;

bearing with one another, forgiving one another, if anyone has a complaint against another; even as Christ forgave you, so you also must do. But above all these things put on love, which is the bond of perfection" (Colossians 3:12–14). The same Greek word *teleiotes* is used, but notice that it is expressed in the fruit of love. In fact Paul uses the word "bond," meaning the uniting principle of perfection. Without love there can be no perfection!

One of the main reasons this world is in its current condition is

love. "But may the God of all grace, who called us to His eternal glory by Christ Jesus, after you have suffered a while, perfect, establish, strengthen, and settle you" (1 Peter. 5:10). Suffering speaks of the Christians' part in the perfection process. They must experience life that is contrary to what they know is God's way, to experience that only God's way produces love, joy and peace.

Peter used a different Greek word for perfect, but it has much the same effect. It is *katartizo*: "to mend (what has been broken or rent), eth-

that, outside of the Church of God, there is very little Godly love in it. This world disobeys God, and ignores His word, and therefore cannot rightly love and therefore cannot be perfect. "Now by this we know that we know Him, if we keep His commandments. He who says, 'I know Him,' and does not keep His commandments, is a liar, and the truth is not in him. But whoever keeps His word, truly the love of God is perfected in him. By this we know that we are in Him" (1 John 2:3–5).

Why is God's Church different? It is different because it keeps His word and faithfully expresses it by keeping His Holy Days and the weekly Sabbath. But it is not just a Christian's effort alone. Christians must yield to Jesus Christ and His spirit in them (Hebrews 13:20–21). The Apostle Peter speaks of a balance of our effort and God's careful

ically: to strengthen, perfect, complete, make one what he ought to be." Man apart from God is broken. He is rent (torn) from God's initial plan at creation because of sin in the Garden of Eden (Genesis 3:23-24). God taught Adam and Eve everything they needed to know about His plan for them (Genesis 2:15-17), much as Christians today are taught by observing the plan of salvation depicted by the Holy Days. Then God left them alone for a period of time, testing them. Satan, as a serpent, convinced them that disobeying God was no problem.

Attaining perfection may look a bit daunting at first glance. Both God and Jesus Christ know that if Christians want to attain perfection it is going to be a challenging battle. But it is a necessary one, which they can win. They must overcome Satan, who is a hater of perfection. Remember he was perfect before he

sinned and he is going to oppose anyone who attempts to attain perfection. "You were perfect in your ways from the day you were created, till iniquity was found in you" (Ezekiel 28:15).

Christians need to remain focused on what God has prepared for them. The Apostle Paul wrote. "Not that I have already attained, or am already perfected (teleios); but I press on, that I may lay hold of that for which Christ Jesus has also laid hold of me. Brethren, I do not count myself to have apprehended, but one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forward to those things which are ahead, I press toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus. Therefore let us, as many as are mature (teleios), have this mind: and if in anything you think otherwise, God will reveal even this to you" (Philippians 3:13-15).

To be perfected or mature, in this sense, means to understand God's plan for man and to work as hard as one can to be in harmony with it, to walk with God and Christ and follow those He uses as they follow Christ (vv. 16–17). Christ is the center of this process (vv. 20–21). But Christ said that there is a work involved in attaining perfection, a work that a Christian must perform. "If you want to be perfect, go, sell what you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven: and come follow me" (Matthew 19:21).

Many Christians today underplay the importance of the church and its ministry in helping to mold that perfection and maturity. But ministerial examples have an important bearing on a Christian's life. The ministry's special calling is a major focal point helping brethren develop spiritually (Ephesians 4:11–16).

In a similar vein, Christians, as they work towards perfection, need

to keep current with the truth that God reveals through His word by the Church, which is "the pillar and ground of truth" (2 Timothy 3:14-17). The Bible is a handbook on perfection. Church members need to study the handbook diligently. "Be diligent to present yourself approved to God, a worker who does not need to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth" (2 Timothy 2:15). Why is this important? The example of Philip and the Ethiopian makes it clear. The Spirit moved Philip to reveal the truth to someone seeking it diligently. "So Philip ran to him, and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah, and said, 'Do you understand what you are reading?' And he said, 'How can I, unless someone guides me?' And he asked Philip to come up and sit with him" (Acts 8:30-31). This does not mean someone cannot understand truth apart from the Church, but those striving for perfection do need those whom God has inspired to understand.

How does knowing and studying God's Word help one to go on to perfection? It provides practical formulas connecting God's laws to everyday relationships with others. Christ amplified the Ten Commandments while He was living on the earth and He inspired the epistle-writers to define them further for even more practical applications.

As an example, Paul's epistle to the Ephesians is one of the most specific letters on perfecting individual character. Paul encourages fellow Christians by outlining their walk with Jesus Christ as they live their day-by-day lives. A Christian should walk in unity (Ephesians 4:1–16), walk in love (Ephesians 5: 1–7), walk in light (vv. 8–14) and walk in wisdom (vv. 15–21). Paul also introduces some of the most moving descriptions in the Bible of

how to achieve the ideal marriage (vv. 22–33). Paul concludes his epistle with one of the best formulas for attaining Christian perfection found in the Bible (Ephesians 6:10–17).

For practicing Christians, enduring trials and tests as they pursue righteousness helps to develop perfection. But it takes time, and there is a need for patience. What God has in store for us will take time to develop. "Therefore be patient, brethren, until the coming of the Lord. See how the farmer waits for the precious fruit of the earth, waiting patiently for it until it receives the early and latter rain. You also be patient. Establish your hearts, for the coming of the Lord is at hand. Do not grumble against one another, brethren, lest you be condemned. Behold, the Judge is standing at the door" (James 5:7-11)! Those God has used throughout history displayed extreme patience in the face of heavy trials, and Christians are to emulate their approach (vv. 10–11).

These examples are listed as a permanent monument in what is called the faith chapter of the Bible, Hebrews 11. They were men and women of faith: Abraham, Sarah, Isaac, Jacob, Moses, the harlot Rahab, and many others, whom Paul calls a "cloud of witnesses" to enduring faith (Hebrews 12:1). Christians—who likewise faithfully endure going on to perfection—are linked with them in the promises. "...God having provided something better for us, that they should not be made perfect apart from us" (Hebrews 11:40).

The trials Christians face relate to the perfection being sought. Paul likens them to being trained in warfare "You therefore, my son, be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus. And the things that you have heard from me among many witnesses, commit these to faithful men who will be able to teach others also. You therefore must endure hardship as a good soldier of Jesus Christ" (2 Timothy 2:1–3).

Some assume that personal striving for perfection is an attempt to gain salvation by works. Others claim it is an exercise in selfishness. Both positions are mistaken. God commands Christians to work at being overcomers. "Therefore, my beloved, as you have always obeyed, not as in my presence only, but now much more in my absence, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling; for it is God who works in you both to will and to do for His good pleasure" (Philippians 2:12-13).

But is all this work toward perfection only for a selfish cause? To believe so is to miss the real purpose of God's plan of salvation and what the individual Feast days really represent. A Christian strives for perfection for one of the most unselfish reasons imaginable. "For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be revealed in us. For the earnest expectation of the creation eagerly waits for the revealing of the sons of God. For the creation was subjected to futility, not willingly, but because of Him who subjected it in hope: because the creation itself also will be delivered from the bondage of corruption into the glorious liberty of the children of God" (Romans 8:18-21).

Christians are the hope of the world! God and Christ desire us to join their family. If a Christian desires that too—to be finished, lacking nothing necessary to completeness, to be full grown, adult, of full age, mature, and wanting it enough to "...go on to perfection..." then it will be a very short and profitable winter ahead! \Box

Mail Processing Department —

From Ground Zero

The Mail Processing Department (MPD) of the Living Church of God started from scratch at the end of November 1998. We had neither postal equipment and office space nor knowledge of postal regulations and methodologies. According to Mr. Wayne Pyle, the home of Mr. and Mrs. Don Davis became the "throbbing heart of MPD." Volunteers crowded into the Davis home to create labels, fold letters and stuff envelopes. After the bread was cast onto the water and the responses began to pour in, Mrs. Ruth Nestor and Mrs. June Olsen processed the incoming mail. Mrs. Nestor said, "It was great reading all the letters of support. There were so many of them. It was inspiring to see the brethren rally for the Truth once again."

A month later, MPD moved into a small unheated warehouse and the first postal equipment was purchased. The envelope printer, postage meter, letter folder and two office computers helped tremendously. However, the suite had few electrical circuits so the electric breakers would often trip, shutting down all the equipment and floor heaters. Regardless of the challenges, "the Work was done in a refreshing and revitalized atmosphere of joy in, zeal for and dedication to the revived Work of God," notes Mr. Pyle.

While rebuilding the department's entire infrastructure, a great deal was accomplished. Our postage meter, which only records mailings through the U.S. Postal Service, recently passed the 100,000 mark. MPD has mailed over 22,693 sermon audio tapes (945 French, 1,280 Spanish and 20,468 English) and over 11,204 sermon video tapes (214 French, 408 Spanish and 10,582 English). We have mailed over 30,000 booklets (9,000 Should You Be Baptized?, 10,000 Build A Joyous Marriage and 11,000 What's Ahead for America and Britain?). Moreover, we sent over 13,000 audio tapes in response to the Tomorrow's World telecast.

The Mail Processing Department's goal is to provide accurate and timely mailings at low cost with minimum resources. We strive for all the brethren to receive the same meat at basically the same time. Therefore, we contracted with an organization that provides fast and reliable service to international areas. We save considerable processing time and video packets reach an international destination in only a few days. Also, letters and other publications are mailed individually outside the U.S. at lower cost with faster delivery.

This month we will install an inserter to dramatically reduce our processing time for member and co-worker letters. For example, it took an average seven hours to process 3,500 letters with a seven-person crew. By using our new inserter and high-speed printer, two people will complete the task in only two hours! Also, the equipment will allow us to even process the semi-annual letter for 30,000 *Tomorrow's World* subscribers, a laborintensive task that is normally outsourced.

As we have implemented technology to better conform to postal regulations, our postage costs continue to decrease. Mailing the booklet *Build A Joyous Marriage* by third class (Standard-A) cost 23.5 cents, but dropped to 17 cents after we received our non-profit status. Moreover, when we implement bar coding to qualify for the automation rate, the cost will fall to 12.5 cents. In other words, mailing 1,000 copies of the booklet within the U.S. would cost \$235 at the third class rate, \$170 at the non-profit rate, and \$125 at the automation rate.

Despite its humble beginnings, the Work continues in greater scope and power. The Mail Processing Department offers a vivid testimony of the Work's impact. The fruits are clearly seen as tapes and publications come in the front door and exit the back door by the vanload—literally. It is inspiring to behold! Each mailing is an illustration that many are still responding to the gospel and warning message. There is much to do and MPD is trying to do its part as we finish this great Work together. \square

"giving all diligence, add to your faith virtue [strength, courage], to virtue knowledge... self control... perseverance... godliness and brotherly kindness" in order "to make your calling and election sure" (2 Peter 1:5–10). Peter's sense of urgency in these passages is unmistakable.

Perhaps the most sobering reason for developing a real sense of urgency about growing, overcoming and doing the work is that our adversary, Satan the devil, will also be increasing his deceptive, divisive and obstructive activities as the end of the age approaches. John left this serious prophetic warning, "...For the devil has come down to you, having great wrath, because he knows that he has a

short time" (Revelation 12:12). Peter cautions, "Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil walks about like a roaring lion seeking whom he may devour. Resist him, steadfast in the faith, knowing that the same sufferings are experienced by your brotherhood in the world" (1 Peter 5:8–9). To effectively counter these supernatural attacks, Paul links his urgent appeals to "wake up" with the necessity to "put on the whole armor of God, that you may be able to stand against the wiles [schemes, strategy, deceits] of the devil" (Ephesians 6:4).

The armor of God Paul refers to includes holding onto the truth, living a righteous life [according to the commandments of God], believing the true Gospel, exercising real faith, trusting in the promise of salvation, using the sword of the Holy Spirit,

praying, watching, and persevering through trials (Ephesians 6:14-18). Being armed before facing an enemy is an urgent necessity. As Christians we cannot afford to lackadaisically have one foot in the world and one foot in the church. We cannot afford to let personal ideas about doctrine and petty differences about administrative procedures divide and distract us from the main focus of our calling-growing in faith, overcoming, preaching the gospel of the coming Kingdom of God and warning this world of the dangers ahead. These activities require a sense of urgency. Are you developing this important quality? Why not make it a personal goal for the coming year? Pray with urgency! Study with a purpose! Live for a mission! God promises a reward if you do! □

obey my will and give what was asked—but to find out what was wrong with me! I realized we did not need to nag at God. NEVER fast as a means of inducing God to answer!

I read of Elijah's prayer, in presence of all the priests of Baal, when God answered and the fire came down from heaven. I timed that prayer. It was *very* short—only about 20 seconds. But the awe-inspiring answer came crashing from heaven instantly! Elijah did not need to talk God into it by a long prayer, or by repeated prayers. But I knew that Elijah at that moment was *close to God*—that he *had previously* been spending *hours* in long prayers to be *in contact* and close communion with His Maker! And he naturally *knew* His Maker would answer!

Gradually the truth began to pierce through the fog in my mind. Gradually, as this process of fasting and prayer continued all day, and into the afternoon of Sunday—as I became more and more hungry—but closer and closer to God, the realization came that I had been keeping my mind more and more fully on this clay project.

In the following pages of his autobiography, Mr. Armstrong relates how God answered *every single request* he had made to God while fasting—plus supplying a couple of additional needs Mr. Armstrong had not thought to ask for! For he had truly been humbly, fervently SEEKING God—and so God ANSWERED in a wonderful and inspiring manner.

Brethren, if we in the Living Church of God will unitedly begin to SEEK GOD in this manner, we ourselves may be astounded at the wonderful results. Again, I urge all of you to please join with me in a CRUSADE to restore the full spirit of Apostolic Christianity within God's Church! *Pray earnestly* for abundant FAITH. Genuinely *study* in a direct effort to make God more real and to build an understanding and dynamic FAITH (Romans 10:17).

Let us *all* join together to beseech God to build within His people a *radiant faith* in Him, in Jesus Christ and in the inspired Word of God. And let us ask God to use His chosen servants today to *powerfully* preach the Gospel, heal the sick and cast out demons (Mark 3:14–15).

In order that a truly effective Work may be done in Christ's name, let us all CRY OUT to God to use us powerfully as His tools so that it may someday be said of us—as it was of Jesus' original disciples: "And they went out and preached everywhere, the Lord working with them and confirming the word through the accompanying SIGNS" (Mark 16:20).
