

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Prepare Now for God's Kingdom

Dear Brethren and Friends,

Greetings from San Diego! This recent Feast of Tabernacles was truly memorable and inspiring! All the reports I have heard and read indicate that it was an *outstanding* Feast in nearly every way.

I will leave the exact attendance figures and other facts for others to fill in—although we certainly did have a fine increase in attendance for this year's Feast of Tabernacles in the Living Church of God around the world. But the *spiritual* aspect of the Feast—the part that counts most with God—was especially uplifting. The depth and understanding and the inspiration in the sermons was most encouraging. The past few years, an increasing degree of love and unity was felt in nearly all of our Feast sites. This year, that warmth and unity continued. Also, as Mr. Charles Bryce expressed it: "The brethren seemed to be even more focused on moving forward." No doubt most of you have sensed that the end of this age really is drawing close and the move of the Church Headquarters to Charlotte, NC, will be the beginning of a *much more powerful Work*.

So all of us need to review our Feast notes and grow and move forward. We *all* need to study God's Word more profoundly, pray more fervently and—as I explained—begin to truly "fellowship" with God and Christ in a more profound way than ever before.

And *all* of us need to be inspired about the Headquarters move to Charlotte and be *fervently praying* for God's guidance and blessing in this move! For this move, I feel, is being made at the *right* time, and for the *right* reasons. As I may have explained in some sermons, I have no close friends or relatives in Charlotte. None of our leading men do, so far as I know. We are moving there even though most of us like the climate in San Diego much better. And there are certainly more recreational and interesting things to do in San Diego. But, if it will enable us to do a much more powerful work, most of us are *more than willing* to move to another location. It appears that God's face is already shining upon us because of this.

Doors are opening that never seemed to open in the same way in any other place we looked. And we have been enabled to buy a Headquarters property for about three million dollars *less* than we would have had to pay out here in San Diego for a similar property. This will free up *hundreds of thousands* of dollars each year—once we have moved and settled in—to go on more television and radio stations, publish more magazines and book-

lets, hire more ministers, hire more Headquarters employees, and to do the Work more powerfully in every way. And if *all* of us—including you dedicated members and brethren—are really zealous about this, then God will pour out His Spirit and help us to have an even deeper *spiritual* understanding and a much greater impact as we do His Work around the world.

It is vital that each of us realize that this world desperately **needs** what we have to give. No, we are not the only ones who have any of the Truth. But, in His mercy, God has made us *more willing* to hang on to the *full* Truth than any other Church of God group on earth. We are practicing the *government of God* more fully—certainly better preparing us to assume positions of leadership in that *same kind of government!* And by devoting a *much larger* portion of our resources to actually "doing the Work" instead of taking care of ourselves, we are going to be enabled to have an increasingly large impact on a sick and confused world out there that desperately needs God's Truth, and desperately needs to be **warned** before the full-scale Tribulation begins.

As we plan and prepare to make this move to Charlotte, I hope that every one of our dedicated brethren will join us in drawing closer to God and praying that God will indeed "pour out His Spirit" upon us in a special way so we can have the kind of impact on the world that the Church of God has not had for many years. As I have often cited to you, Jesus Christ told His followers: "For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. And there will be famines, pestilences, and earthquakes in various places. All these are the beginning of sorrows. 'Then they will deliver you up to tribulation and kill you, and *you will be hated by all nations for My name's sake*" (Matthew 24:7–9).

Not long ago, Hurricane Lili devastated a number of cities and small communities in Louisiana and Texas. Drought is still affecting the American and Canadian farmers and causing food prices to rise, and as disease epidemics increasingly appear even here in North America, we must all realize that the stage is certainly set for the final prophetic events of this era to take place. But Jesus said that—no doubt as our prophetic message increases in power and focus—"You will be *hated* by all nations for My name's sake" (v. 9).

At this point, dear brethren, *not one* of the various "splits" from the former Worldwide Church of God is having a significant impact on the world. The world *cannot* "hate" us if they do not even know we exist! However, as we boldly preach the *true* message of Jesus Christ and powerfully warn modern Israel of the coming Tribulation, we will undoubtedly step on many toes. We must not be focused on simply "attacking" other religions because of their obvious errors. Nor must we be focused on simply "attacking" the world with all of its problems of homosexuality, abortion, fornication, adultery, drunkenness, drug abuse, pornography, crime and such. Nevertheless, we *must* and *will* need to mention these as living examples of what we are talking about. This will certainly not make us "popular." It will bring upon us *enormous persecution* before our work is ultimately finished.

ith an upcoming move to Charlotte, North Carolina, and other areas of growth and change in the offing, it is *vital* for all of our people to come to a deeper faith and trust in Jesus Christ. It is easy to forget that Jesus Christ is *alive* and *very active*! That He is the living Head of the Church. That He is aware of the smallest detail. That, indeed, "the very hairs on your head are all numbered!" (Matthew 10:30).

God's "Instruction Manual"—the Holy Bible—speaks of the resurrected Jesus Christ in this way: "And He is the **Head** of the body, the church, who is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, that in all things He may have the preeminence" (Colossians 1:18). And in Ephesians 1:22–23, Paul speaks of how God "put all things under His [Christ's] feet and gave Him to be **Head** over all things to the church, which is His body, the fullness of Him who fills all in all."

Do we truly believe that Christ is the "Head over all things" to the Church?

Thousands of God's people became disillusioned by some of the upsets and trials of the 1970s. Then, by the late 1980s and early 1990s, many of us were deeply concerned about the introduction of major heresies in our former association—and in the absolute "trashing" of Mr. Herbert Armstrong and all that he represented and had taught us.

"Where was Jesus Christ in all of this?" many wondered.

But now, in retrospect, it should be fairly easy for a Spirit-led Christian to see that this time of trial was truly needed. For tens of thousands in our former association were not converted. They were simply "going along for the ride." They had just "grown up in the church" without ever coming to a profound, heartfelt repentance and full conversion. Or, as an adult, some had become excited by Mr. Armstrong's understanding of prophecy and/or had proved to them-

tually every strange and perverted teaching imaginable! That is sad to say, but very true.

Also, as one evangelist said years ago: "It was time for the Laodecian church era to begin." So God allowed a major spiritual "test" to come on His people during those years. It appears that most of those weak and confused individuals failed this major test. They very quickly gave up the major truths of genuine Apostolic Christianity and slid back into the "mainstream" of American Protestantism!

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Did Jesus Abolish the Law?

any sincere Christians have been told that the laws of God in the Old Testament—about the Sabbath, the Holy Days, clean and unclean foods and tithing—have been abolished and are no longer relevant for New Testament Christians. Supposedly, these ancient laws were "nailed to the cross" by the sacrifice of Jesus Christ. Professing Christians are told that they are no longer "under bondage" to the Old Covenant and its "outdated laws" recorded by Moses, but are now under a New Covenant—at liberty to worship God in whatever manner they choose.

Words of the Apostle Paul are commonly cited in support of this teaching: Romans 6:14—that we are no longer under the law but under grace; Colossians 2:14—that Jesus blotted out the handwriting of ordinances that was against us; Galatians 3:13—that Christ has redeemed us from the curse of the law; and Galatians 3:24–25—that the law was only a tutor to bring us to Christ and that we are no longer under a tutor.

Concluding that these scriptures "abolish the law" may seem logical to some who do not read the whole Bible carefully and who lack the Holy Spirit. But do these scriptures really teach that the law is abolished? Or is this false doctrine a part of the subtle scheme Satan has devised to deceive the professing Christian world? We need to understand what the Bible reveals about this vital subject, because this issue has divided and splintered the body of Christ down through the ages. Conflicts over the law have crippled the work of God and confused many people. To misunderstand this issue could result in losing your salvation and your eternal reward!

New Testament Warnings

One of the first things to note is that a misunderstanding of isolated verses in Paul's writings may suggest to some that Christ abolished the necessity to keep the laws of God, yet the Apostle Peter clearly warned that Paul's epistles contain "some things hard to understand, which those who are untaught and unstable twist to their own destruction, as they do also the rest of the Scriptures" (2 Peter 3:16). At the beginning of His ministry Jesus warned about false teachers who would come in sheep's clothing (claiming to be Christians) and lead people astray (Matthew 7:15-20). At the end of His earthly ministry Jesus issued a prophetic warning, "take heed that no one deceives you. For many will come in my name [claiming to be Christian teachers]... and will deceive many" (Matthew 24:3-5).

Paul also warned that false teachers would arise within the Church, and draw disciples away from the truth (Acts 20:29-31). Paul specifically stated, "in the last days" many would follow a false Christianity "having a form of godliness but denying its power" (2 Timothy 3:1-5). We deny the power of biblical religion when we ignore or reason around what the Bible clearly teaches! This is why Paul advised the church in Thessalonica to "prove all things and hold fast what is good" (1 Thessalonians 5:21), and why Luke records the example of the Bereans who "searched the Scriptures daily to find out" if what they were hearing from the disciples of Jesus was really true (Acts 17:10-12). The real test of doctrinal truth is agreement with all the scriptures on a subject-not just a few taken out of context! To understand whether Jesus abolished the laws of God pertaining to the Sabbath, Holy Days and similar subjects, we need to step back and look not just at a few verses out of context, but at the *big picture* as revealed in both the Old and New Testaments.

Law Before Sinai?

Today, many wrongly assume that the laws recorded by Moses were merely part of the Old Covenant (between God and ancient Israel) that was terminated at Christ's death, and that they therefore no longer apply to Christians who live under a new covenant. *However, the Bible reveals something quite different!* The New Testament explains that "through one man [Adam] *sin* entered the world" (Romans 5:12). Sin is the transgression of the laws of God (1 John 3:4). There can be no sin where there are no laws of God (Romans 4:15). Adam and Eve sinned by

Bible reveals that Abraham was blessed "because Abraham obeyed My voice and kept My charge [instructions], My commandments, My statutes, and My laws" (Genesis 26:5), yet those commandments, statutes and laws are not listed until Moses recorded them (see Exodus 20–23) as part of the covenant between God and the nation of Israel.

When God revealed knowledge of the Sabbath at Creation, He *sanctified* (set apart and made holy) the seventh day, and rested to show how to keep the Sabbath (Genesis 2:1–3). Many sincere Christians have been told that we can worship on whatever day we desire, or that church tradition has established Sunday as the day on which we are to worship God. Yet the Bible nowhere condones such practices! The Israelites were given instructions for observing the Passover and the Days of Unleavened Bread—and the Sabbath—*before* the Old Covenant was agreed to (see Exodus 12; 16:23–26).

God will forever share with His family the blessings of God-life and all He possesses (Revelation 21:7). The divine family will be sharing life and its joys and its labors through creative work forever. With an eternity to engage in creative endeavor, the possibilities are endless.

violating the laws of God. They dishonored their parent (God) and put another god before Him when they listened to Satan. They also lusted after and stole what God said was forbidden, and then lied to cover their guilt, instead of admitting that they had made a mistake. Cain was warned before he murdered his brother that giving into anger would lead to sin (breaking a law of God—Genesis 4:6–8). Scripture clearly indicates that the laws of God were in force from the beginning of creation—thousands of years before Moses recorded the Ten Commandments.

Noah is called a "preacher of righteousness" (2 Peter 2:5), and the Bible defines righteousness as "all Thy commandments are righteousness" (Psalm 119:172)—so the only logical conclusion is that Noah preached obedience to the commandments of God! Some, wishing to deny the need to obey God's laws, have proposed that Moses was preaching different commandments than those mentioned in the Bible. Yet in Genesis, we learn that Abraham and Jacob tithed (Genesis 14:18-20; 28:22) even though the tithing system is not fully explained until later in the writings of Moses (see Deuteronomy 14:22-28). Sodom and Gomorrah were destroyed for sins including sexual perversion (Genesis 19:1–13), yet homosexuality is not termed a sin until Leviticus 18:22 (see also Romans 1:24-27). Adultery is recognized as a "great sin" (Genesis 20:1-12) before it is listed as one of the Ten Commandments. The

When the Israelites failed to follow the instructions for keeping the Sabbath, God asked: "How long do you *refuse* to keep *My commandments and My laws?*" (v. 28), which clearly indicates that the laws of God—including the Sabbath and Holy Days—were in force *before* the Old Covenant. The termination of the Old Covenant did not remove the necessity to obey the laws of God that were in force *before* the covenant was made!

The Old Covenant

One subtle argument wrongly suggests that since the Old Covenant and the writings of Moses contain *hundreds* of laws, and that anyone who believes in keeping the Sabbath, the Holy Days, tithing and the dietary laws must then also keep *everything* that was part of the Old Covenant; they say that anything less amounts to making an *arbitrary selection* of which laws to keep. Such an argument illustrates the ignorance about the Old Covenant, and blindness about the real meaning of Scripture, that has permeated professing Christian churches over the centuries.

The Old Covenant was a formal agreement between God and the ancient nation of Israel. It consisted of promises of *physical* blessings, and of being a special people, *if* the Israelites obeyed God's laws and provided an

example to the world (see Exodus 19:5-6; Deuteronomy 4:1-10). It included no spiritual promises of eternal life, or of receiving the Holy Spirit, and it included warnings of punishment for disobedience. This agreement consisted of obedience to three laws: the Ten types of Commandments (Exodus 20), the statutes, judgments and ordinances (Exodus 21-23) and the ceremonial laws (see Exodus 25-40). This fundamental distinction is essential to understanding what practices were no longer required upon the establishment of the New Covenant.

The Ten Commandments form the fundamental core of the laws of God. The first four (including the Sabbath commandment) explain how to love God (Deuteronomy 6:5), and the last six explain how God wants us to show love for our neighbors (Leviticus 19:18). These laws have been in force since creation, and will continue through all eternity because the nature of God does not change (Malachi 3:6). The statutes and judgments show how to apply the Ten Commandments (God's laws of love) in specific situations. Many of these same principles can be found in the civil laws of nations around the world today (see Exodus 21). The biblical laws were given for the benefit of humankind, and you can even wind up in jail today if you violate some of them! These laws are a blessing—even in civil society not a "curse."

The *ceremonial laws* are a different matter altogether. The Bible reveals that the laws concerning sacrifices and offerings were *not* originally part of the Old Covenant (Jeremiah 7:21–23). These laws were *added* later "because of transgressions" (Galatians 3:19). Paul

Dietary Laws—Abolished?

For centuries, many professing Christians have been led to believe that observing the biblical laws of clean and unclean foods is no longer essential for salvation. It is claimed that these "laws" were a part of the Old Covenant that was terminated with the death of Jesus Christ. This belief, however, is not supported by the Bible. The first reference to clean and unclean foods is found in the book of Genesis. The instruction given to Noah, to take seven pairs of clean animals and two pairs of unclean animals on the ark (Genesis 7:1–3), indicates that Noah knew about the dietary laws long before they were fully explained in the writings of Moses (see Leviticus 11). The extra pairs of clean animals would obviously have been used for food, and not just preserved to reproduce after the flood. From the Bible we also learn that the blood of animals was forbidden as a food (Deuteronomy 12:23-25). These laws were given "that it may go well with you and your children forever, when you do what is good and right in the sight of the LORD your God" (Deuteronomy 12:28). God would not do away with an instruction that He refers to in this way.

Some teach that Jesus Christ did away with the dietary laws, yet the verses commonly used to make this false assertion actually concern ceremonial washings (see Matthew 15:1–20; Mark 7:1–23). When we read the accounts, we see that Jesus does not even mention clean or unclean foods. He refers instead to the Pharisees' question about eating without following a traditional ritual of hand washing (Mark 7:3–8). The words "thus He declared all foods clean" found in some translations of Mark 7:19 were added by translators trying to make this verse say something that neither the context nor the original Greek text supports. When Peter, in a vision, was instructed to eat unclean animals that appeared on a great sheet, he was puzzled because he recognized that this was contrary to the laws of God (Act 10:9-17). However, Peter did not conclude that the dietary laws were abolished; he realized: "God has shown me that I should not call any man common or unclean" (Acts 10:28) indicating that Cornelius (a Gentile) could also become a Christian. Decisions by the council in Jerusalem affirm the need to follow biblical dietary laws (Acts 15:28–29; see also Leviticus 3:17; 7:23–26). These laws were designed to prevent infectious disease and promote health (Exodus 15:26; Deuteronomy 12:28). If our bodies are "the temple of God" (1 Corinthians 3:16–17) and we are instructed to "glorify God in our bodies" (1 Corinthians 6:19-20) we will not deliberately ingest food that God forbids and that modern science has linked with the spread of disease.

The prophet Isaiah reveals more on this subject. When Jesus Christ returns to judge the world, "those... eating swine's flesh and the abomination [broth of abominable things] and the mouse shall be consumed together" (Isaiah 66:15–17; see also Isaiah 65:4). These verses indicate God's displeasure with those who eat "unclean" foods that He instructed should not be eaten. One of the reasons that sickness will disappear in the coming kingdom of God (Isaiah 35:5–6; Jeremiah 30:17) is that the laws of God will be taught and explained to human beings all over the earth (Isaiah 2:2–3; 11:9; 30:20–21). The Bible does not support the idea that the dietary laws have been abolished; rather, it explains how these important laws fit into the plan of God.

could not be speaking here of the Ten Commandments, which formed the core of the Old Covenant and were in force from creation. Even the Mosaic writings indicate that the ritual sacrifices and offerings did not begin *until* the Tabernacle was dedicated—a year after the Old Covenant was made at Sinai (Exodus 40:17, 29). The Bible plainly shows that the ceremonial laws were *additions* to the Old Covenant and, as we will see, were of a *temporary* nature. These alone, were terminated at the death of Jesus.

A Matter of Context

Critics have asked: If laws were given "forever"—including the ritual laws—how can some such laws be just temporary? The answer lies in understanding what the term "forever" means in its proper biblical context. The Bible commands that the Sabbath and the Holy Days are to be observed forever (Exodus 31:17; Leviticus 23:41). When we see that Christ, the Apostles and the early Church kept these days, and that these practices will be observed in the kingdom of God (Isaiah 66:22-23; Zechariah 14:16-19), it should be obvious that "forever" in this context means "for all eternity." When we read that the Aaronic priesthood was to be perpetual (Exodus 29:9), that priests were to wear special garments forever (Exodus 28:42-43) and to tend a lamp in the Tabernacle, or temple, forever (Exodus 27:21), the word "forever" is used in a different context. The Tabernacle and the temple no longer exist, so there is no lamp to tend! The Bible reveals that the priesthood has been changed (Hebrews 7:12), so instructions about wearing special garments no longer apply. Laws that allow a servant to decide to serve a master forever can only apply as long as the servant or master remains alive—which is obviously not for eternity! These simple observations illustrate what was permanent and what was temporary about the Old Covenant. The fundamental aspects of the spiritual laws of God never change. The ceremonial rituals were no longer required of Christians.

Jesus, the Apostles and the Law

But many will ask: if we "love the Lord and believe in Jesus," must we still *obey* the laws of God? Regrettably, many sincere believers have been told that Christianity is about love, not "rules and regulations" which critics term *legalism*! While this argument may *seem* reasonable to some, the Bible tells a *different* story! Jesus said: "Do *not* think that I came to destroy [annul] the Law or the Prophets. I did not come to destroy but to fulfill [complete]" (Matthew 5:17). Scripture explains that Christ came to "magnify [amplify, expand] the law and make it honorable" (Isaiah 42:21). Jesus taught that we must

obey not just the *letter* of the law, but also the *spirit* (or intent) of the law (Matthew 5:21–30). When Jesus was asked how we enter the kingdom of God, and He replied that we must *keep the commandments*, He was referring, in context, to obeying the Ten Commandments (Matthew 19:16–20). He equated "loving the Lord" with *obeying the commandments* (John 14:15)—yet His plain statements are ignored by many today. Jesus *did not* abolish the Sabbath or the Holy Days, but kept them and instructed His disciples to do the same (Luke 4:16; John 7:8–19). Jesus taught that we "ought" to tithe (Matthew 23:23). It should be obvious that the common idea—held by many professing Christians—that Jesus abolished the law is an *erroneous assumption* that is *not* supported by the Bible.

Many wrongly assume that the Apostles and the early Church came to realize that the "Mosaic Laws" covering the Sabbath, Holy Days, the dietary laws and tithing were no longer required of New Testament Christians. However, this is *not* what we find in the book of Acts. The Bible reveals not only that Paul kept the Sabbath (some 20 years after the Crucifixion; see Acts 17:1-2), but that he also continued to observe the Holy Days (Acts 18:21), and even admonished other Christians to do the same (1 Corinthians 5:7–8). This is consistent with what historians record about the early Church. Edward Gibbon wrote that the early Jerusalem Church, for nearly a century after the death of Jesus Christ, "united the law of Moses [including tithing] with the doctrine of Christ" until pressure from Gentile converts led to the rejection of these biblical and Apostolic practices (see The Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire, chapter 15).

While the writings of Paul are sometimes offered as evidence that keeping the law is not required of New Testament Christians, it is worth noticing what Paul himself had to say about obedience to the Law. The *biblical* Paul says that not hearers but "*doers* of the law will be justified" (Romans 2:13), that the law is for our instruction (Romans 2:18) and that the law defines what sin actually is (Romans 3:20). He explains that faith does not abolish, but *establishes*, the law (Romans 3:31), and that "the law is holy and the commandment holy and just and good" (Romans 7:12). Paul echoes the teachings of Jesus when he states that "love is the fulfilling of the law"—referring to *obeying* the Ten Commandments (Romans 13:8–10). For Paul, keeping the commandments was *the way* to become a Christian—it was not legalism!

But what does Paul mean when he *appears* to say just the opposite? In Colossians 2:14–15, the "handwriting of ordinances" (bond of indebtedness) that was "nailed to the cross" does *not* refer to the laws of God, but to *our sins*. When we sin, we incur a debt—a death penalty (Romans 6:23). This death penalty is the *curse* from

which Christ's death redeemed us (Galatians 3:13). The law of God cannot be a curse, for Paul himself said it was holy, just and good! When Paul writes that we are "not under the law, but under grace," he means that when we have repented and begun to obey the laws of God we are no longer under the *penalty of the law* (death) since we have received unmerited pardon, and thus we are not to sin (not to break the laws of God, cf. Romans 6:15). When Paul states that "man is not justified by the *works of the law,*" he is using a term that specifically refers to *ritualistic* practices—not to the Ten Commandments (see Galatians 2:16; 3:2, 10 and *Biblical Archaeology Review,*

to reason around them and look for excuses not to obey them. While most professing Christians hope to be in the kingdom of God, many seem to be unaware that "the law" will go forth out of Zion [Jerusalem] when Jesus Christ sets up His kingdom on this earth (Isaiah 2:2–4). The saints, as teachers in the kingdom, will teach the world to observe the Sabbath (Isaiah 66:22–23), the Holy Days (Zechariah 14:16–19) and the dietary laws (Isaiah 66:15–17). The New Covenant will be based on the laws of God—just as the Old Covenant was. But with the New Covenant come *spiritual* promises: of forgiveness of sin after sincere repentance, of the Holy Spirit and of eternal

We should be thankful for *the truth* that God has made plain in His Word, and that we have not been duped by the many false arguments, because Jesus warned that *many* would be deceived about this fundamental issue (Matthew 24:4–5, 11, 24). Let us continue to pray, and study, so that we may not lose sight of the truth!

Nov-Dec. 1994). When Paul states that "the law was our tutor to bring us to Christ... but after faith has come, we are no longer under a tutor" (Galatians 3:24-25), he is referring to the temporary nature of the entire system of statutes, ceremonial laws, rituals and sacrifices that pointed to the need for a Savior. This is what the book of Galatians is discussing. He is not saying that the fundamental laws of God-the Ten Commandments, the Sabbath, the Holy Days, tithing and the dietary laws have been abolished. This is confirmed by his statements in Hebrews 9:9-10. The writings of Paul, when viewed in their total context, do not support the idea that obedience to the laws of God is no longer required of Christians. For many professing Christians, it boils down to a matter of "which Paul" they are going to believe-the Paul of Scripture, or the Paul created by critics of the law!

The New Covenant and the Law

Most professing Christians today hold *conflicting beliefs*—that they are under a new covenant, and that they are no longer required to keep the laws of God—spelled out in detail in the writings of Moses—because these laws are now written in their minds and hearts (Hebrews 8:1–13; 10:16; Jeremiah 31:31–33). Yet the same God who inspired these verses also explained that, under the New Covenant, He would give His rebellious people a new spirit "that they may *walk* in My statutes and *keep* My judgments and do them" (Ezekiel 11:19–20; 36:24–27). All who have the laws of God written in their minds and hearts will *want* to keep the laws of God, not

life. That is why the New Covenant is called a "better" covenant (Hebrews 12:24). There is more to the New Covenant than just loving the Lord and loving your neighbor—it also involves learning to observe *rules and regulations* (the laws of God) that keep us pointed in the right direction.

Those who wrongly teach that Christians no longer need to obey the laws of God fail to realize that their reasonings are a product of the carnal human mind—a mind that does not have access to, or is not using, the Holy Spirit. Paul explains that such a mind "is enmity against God; for it is not subject to the law of God, nor indeed can be" (Romans 8:7). An unconverted mind tries to reason around—or simply ignores—the laws of God, in spite of the fact that a person may profess to believe in God and love the Lord. Satan is able to influence and deceive anyone in this frame of mind (2 Corinthians 4:3-4). The Bible reveals that this is the basic reason why so many assume that Jesus abolished the law—a concept that is *unsupported* by the Scriptures and alien to the whole plan of God. The laws of God outline a way of life that God has emphasized from creation, which Christians are called to learn to live now, so that they will be able to teach it to the world in the coming kingdom of God. We should be thankful for the truth that God has made plain in His Word, and that we have not been duped by the many false arguments, because Jesus warned that many would be deceived about this fundamental issue (Matthew 24:4-5, 11, 24). Let us continue to pray, and study, so that we may not lose sight of the truth!

"Are you 'Good Enough' Yet?"

Understanding the Righteousness That Is by Faith

ave you ever wondered whether or not you will "make it" into the Kingdom of God? Have you wondered whether you are good enough for the Kingdom right now? If you are going to enter the Kingdom, how much better must you become? Perhaps you have not phrased the questions in exactly this way, but these thoughts have gone through the minds of many in God's Church.

Down through time, devoutly religious people have engaged in a wide variety of practices in attempting to make themselves "good enough." During the Middle Ages, many sincere people lived lives of incredible asceticism trying to make themselves worthy of heaven. In order to recruit soldiers for the Crusades, to take back Jerusalem from the Arabs, the Roman Catholic Church promised recruits that their going to fight the Muslims would win them absolution from their sins and give them entrance into heaven at death.

Some of the Jews in Jesus' day also wondered how they could ensure that they were "good enough" to inherit the Kingdom. Jesus, in one of His parables, told the story of the Pharisee who, in prayer, reminded God how much better he was than ordinary people. The Pharisee thanked God that he was not like other people, and reminded Him that he fasted twice in the week and very carefully paid his tithes (Luke 18:10-12). Surely all of this scrupulous observance, he thought, would make him good enough and guarantee his entrance into God's Kingdom.

The Apostle Paul commented on the religious zeal of many of the Jews of his day, like this Pharisee, who displayed an attitude that Paul himself had once shared. "For I bear them witness," he wrote, " that they have a zeal for God, but not according to knowledge. For they being ignorant of God's righteousness, and seeking to establish their own righteousness, have not submitted to the righteousness of God" (Romans 10:2-3). They strove to make themselves "good enough," just as have many sincere people throughout the centuries. Yet with all of their effort, they missed the point. Over the years, many, even in the Church of God, have fallen into the same pitfall as the religious Jews of whom Paul wrote.

When we seek to establish our own righteousness-to make ourselves "good enough"—there are two possible results. Some wind up self-righteous a smug, approach similar to the Pharisee that Jesus described in the parable. They look down on others who just never seem to "get it together" the way they do. They are proud of their careful obedience, and smug in their relationship with God. More commonly, those who are striving to make themselves "good enough" wind up discouraged and overwhelmed, with a sense of their own inadequacy and imperfection. They worry that they will not ever measure up, and therefore will never make it. Such a state of mind can lead one to say, "What's the use?" or "Why even try?" This eventually leads many to give up and fall by the wayside, rather

than continue their journey of the Christian life.

Looking to Abraham and Sarah

The books of Romans and Galatians, where Paul most fully discusses the subject of righteousness by faith, often discuss the example of Abraham and his relationship with God. Many of the Jewish religious leaders felt that circumcision—the sign of God's covenant with Abraham—was necessary for all men who desired unfettered access to the Creator and entrance into His Kingdom. This ceremony was absolutely necessary for salvation, they declared (Acts 15:1). Paul strongly disagreed with these critics, but did not rely on human ideas and human reasoning to prove them wrong. Rather, he used the authority of Scripture to prove his point. He went to the first book of the Torah, to the account of Abraham in the book of Genesis, to illuminate the true basis of a real relationship with the Creator God.

Paul knew that if his readers truly understood the story of Abraham, and of the relationship that developed between this ancient patriarch and the Creator of the Universe, they would understand the means by which entrance into the Kingdom of God can truly be assured. If they understood the principles illustrated by Abraham's story, they would finally understand the meaning of righteousness that comes by faith.

What did Abraham do that merited his being made the heir of such amazing promises from God? Did God Living Church News November–December 2002

make His promises to Abraham because he was the first man to become circumcised? Paul thundered emphatically: "No!" God made the promises to Abraham before he became circumcised (Romans 4:9-12). When Abraham was 75 years old, God had told him to leave his homeland and his family, and go to a land that God would show him and afterward give to his descendants. Years before Abraham was circumcised, he had come to trust God. As he came to know God more and more deeply, he trusted him more fully and completely. Paul explained that Abraham's relationship with God rested on faith, and not on works that Abraham had accomplished.

Still childless at an advanced age, Abraham nevertheless believed God's promises. Abraham's relationship with his Creator grew because God was very real to Abraham, who learned to trust God completely (Romans 4:19-21). When Abraham was 99 years old, God appeared to him and proposed a covenant that resulted in the birth of a son and heir within the year. God chose circumcision to be the sign of that covenant. Paul emphasized that Abraham's relationship with God existed long before circumcision—and was based on faith, not on a specific act or ceremony that he carried out. Paul emphasized that this example contains the key to understanding how we all can have a genuine relationship with our Creator, and be assured of entrance into His Kingdom.

You see, there is a futility involved in human efforts to "be good enough." As the ancient prophet Isaiah explained in Isaiah 64:6, all of our humanly contrived righteousness is like filthy rags. Our own human efforts can *never* be good enough! Seven centuries before Paul wrote Romans and Galatians, Isaiah emphasized the importance of the pattern set by both Abraham and Sarah, which true believers were to emulate.

He wrote: "Listen to Me, you who follow after righteousness, you who seek the LORD: look to the rock from which you were hewn, and to the hole of the pit from which you were dug. Look unto Abraham your father, and to Sarah who bore you; for I called him alone, and blessed him and increased him" (Isaiah 51:1–2). But why would Isaiah instruct those who wished to pursue righteousness to look to Abraham and Sarah? He did so because of their *living* faith.

The Difference Between Dead Faith and Living Faith

Faith is the basis of true right-eousness, as Paul emphasized in Romans and Galatians! But what kind of faith? Was he talking about the "I believe in sweet Jesus" outlook so typical to the approach of many Protestants? Emphatically not! The kind of faith that Paul and the other biblical writers taught is a life-changing faith. This faith is not an empty belief, or a mere profession of pleasant sentiments. It involves a confidence that sets a pattern for a Christian's life.

Paul explained "that if you confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes to righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made to salvation" (Romans 10:9–10). If we really believe from the very depth of our being that Jesus Christ is alive and at the right hand of the Father, it will *change* our whole life! If this does not change our life, then we really do not believe it very deeply.

James, the half-brother of Jesus Christ and the Apostle who presided over the Jerusalem Church, made this same point using different words. He explained in James 2:19–20: "You believe that there is one God. You do well. Even the demons believe—and tremble! But

do you want to know, O foolish man, that faith without works is dead?" Faith that does not manifest itself with actions is dead and empty. Such dead faith never saved anyone. James then discussed Abraham's example. "Was not Abraham our father justified by works when he offered Isaac his son on the altar? Do you see that faith was working together with his works, and by works faith was made perfect? And the Scripture was fulfilled which says, 'Abraham believed God, and it was accounted to him for righteousness.' And he was called the friend of God" (vv. 21-23).

Abraham ordered his whole life all his decisions and choices—on his absolute conviction that God was real and that His word was sure. His faith gave him strength to move away from everyone and everything that he knew, it enabled him to wait for decades in anticipation of the inheritance God had promised, and it empowered him to be willing to make the ultimate sacrifice of his only legitimate son when God instructed him to do so. Abraham followed and obeyed God because he trusted Him. The Eternal God was not only Abraham's creator—He was his friend!

Isaiah wrote of looking not only to Abraham, but also to Sarah. Peter further developed this theme by showing that Sarah is an example to all Christian women, "as Sarah obeyed Abraham, calling him lord, whose daughters you are if you do good and are not afraid with any terror" (1 Peter 3:6). Faith in God was the basis of Sarah's continuing respect for and deference to Abraham. Her example of faith set a pattern for Christian women to emulate. So often, the fear of what might happen paralyzes us, or causes us to panic and take matters into our own hands. In Sarah's life, faith triumphed over fear. Her submission to Abraham was not based on a conviction that his judgment was always impeccable, but rather in her Living Church News November–December 2002

confidence that God had established the structure of the family. She knew that she could be a submissive wife and trust God to take care of her. Peter told Christian women, in effect, that they are daughters of Sarah if they allow their lives to be governed by faith rather than by fears.

John 11 gives us an example that helps us understand the difference between the righteousness that comes by faith, and that which is merely the result of human efforts at being "good enough." Christ's astounding miracle of raising Lazarus from the dead "got people talking" all around Jerusalem, and convinced many that Jesus must indeed be the Messiah prophesied in Scripture. When word of this reached the Pharisees, they arranged a conference with their archrivals, the Sadducees. "Word of this miracle is going to get out and cause everyone to believe that He is the Messiah," they reasoned, "and this is going to cause great problems with the Romans. They will be upset with all of this talk of a King of the Jews and will come and take away both our place and our nation. We've got to do something. In fact, we've got to ensure that Jesus of Nazareth dies!"

When it really came down to it, God and His promises seemed remote and unreal to these religious leaders. They were more concerned about the Roman legions, whom they could see, than they were about the invisible Creator. Here were men who prided themselves on being righteous. They certainly did not think that the law had been done away. Yet, when they became frightened about the future, they took matters into their own hands rather than looking to God. Righteousness to them consisted simply of rituals, ceremonies and rules that were to be obeyed meticulously. This was far different from the approach of Abraham, whom they considered their father. Obedience that does not flow from faith will never stand up under stress or the test of time.

True obedience is the *result* of a genuine relationship with God, and flows *from* it. Where does that relationship originate? It does not start with us, or with our ability to be "good enough" to earn God's approval and acceptance. Rather, it starts with God and what *He has done* for us. He com-

gave His uniquely begotten Son to pay for our sins by dying in our stead, then raised Him from the dead and restored Him to His right hand in heaven where He serves as our High Priest. He took the initiative in our lives by offering us a slate wiped absolutely clean from the record of our sins and a chance to share life with Him as a member of His very family forever. This represents God's

mended his love toward us in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us (Romans 5:8). God took the initiative in our lives, but we must *respond* to His initiative with *living faith*. That is what Abraham did when God told him to leave his homeland and family behind for a new land that God would afterwards give to him. Because Abraham truly believed God, he obeyed.

The originators of Rabbinic Iudaism in the second and first centuries BC took a far different approach. They sought to establish and ensure righteousness by inventing more rules. Strict adherence to such rules would ensure God's favor, they reasoned. developed ever-increasing emphasis on the externals, but in the process the inner relationship with God fell by the wayside. Christ compared many of them to whitewashed tombs, since outwardly they appeared fresh and clean but inwardly they were filled with rot and decay (Matthew 23:27). In the midst of all of their efforts and their striving, they had lost sight of what God was really after (v. 23).

Real righteousness is made possible by what God has done. The Father

grace, or His freely offered gifts. However, we must respond to God's grace with faith. If we trust Him to guide us, to change us and to save us, we will surrender both our life and our will. We will want to fully obey Him and to seek His guidance in every aspect of our lives, because we will be convinced that God is always right! "Therefore we were buried with Him through baptism into death, that just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life" (Romans 6:4). A life regulated by faith is a new life!

You and I can never make ourselves "good enough," but God can and will if only we will trust Him and surrender to Him. He has already arranged to pay in full our debt of sin, a debt that we could not even begin to work off in a thousand lifetimes! If we really believe what God has done for us, and understand what He offers us, it will change our whole lives by leading us to respond to Him—just as did Abraham, Paul and so many others. Such a living faith will reorder all of our priorities in life, and will produce in us the righteousness that is by faith!



International Corner...

European Update

Reports from Feast sites in Ireland and France have been very positive this year. Efforts are currently underway to finalize plans for the Feast in 2003. We hope that arrangements for next year can be announced shortly.

The advertising programs in the United Kingdom, Ireland and Europe continue to grow and draw responses. The first ad for the fall in the UK, for the booklet Fourteen Signs Announcing Christ's Return, has posted over 1,900 requests to date. Another ad is planned for the spring. In Ireland, an advertisement on the topic of prayer has brought a good response. Advertisements in November will feature the Beast of Revelation booklet and Fourteen Signs Announcing Christ's Return. Currently the Dutch Web site and German Web site offer booklets and articles translated into those languages.

Just after the Feast, we began a new video group in Bedford (north of London). We have also begun holding services in Radlett (near St. Alban's and Bricket Wood) on the first Sabbath of every month. It has been encouraging to see interest begin to grow in that area.

Bali Update

October 12, 2002 will go down as a day of infamy. Indications are that more Australians were killed

in this one event than any other since World War II.

Not since the bombing of Darwin in 1942 could have so many perished. Just two days since suspected Al Qaeda terrorists detonated two bombs at the resort of Kuta Beach on the island of Bali, Indonesia, 20 Australians are confirmed dead. Another 200 burned and wounded have been airlifted to the mainland to capital city hospitals.

One hundred and sixty are still unaccounted for.

Melbourne's modern burns unit at the Alfred Hospital received its first victim, a man with 50 percent burns, head injuries and shrapnel. He is in a critical but stable condition. Eye witnesses tell of people running away from the blast scene with shards of glass protruding from their necks. Many died from loss of blood but most of the dead have been burned beyond recog-Local Balinese. Europeans, Canadians and New Zealanders are also believed to be among the dead, but the majority appear to be Australians at this popular tourist island. Hundreds of footballers were on the island celebrating their end of season. One club from Perth lost seven of its players, another from Sydney is missing five of theirs.

The nation is in shock as the reality sinks in that global terrorism could be directed specifically at Australians. No longer can this far-flung continent feel secure.

Gainsayers are accusing Prime Minister John Howard of being too supportive of President George W. Bush's war on terrorism. Like many Europeans, some Australians believe appeasement will keep them safe. Both history and prophecy tell us this will not happen.

It is because Australians, like the rest of the modern descendants of Israel, have rejected God that He will allow such calamities to befall them. Just as a loving father corrects his children, so God likewise is beginning to chastise our people (Hebrews 12:5–11).

"But if you will not obey me... I will do this to you: I will even appoint terror over you," says Almighty God in Leviticus 26:14–16. "Those who hate you shall reign over you, and you shall flee when no one pursues you" (v. 17).

God loves all mankind and has a great plan for their salvation. He also has a wonderful plan for the people of modern day Israel, including the Australian nation. That plan means that He must warn them of their desperate moral condition. He wants them to repent and obey Him so that they can be amongst those who will teach others in the coming Kingdom of God.

South Africa Update

We are praying that God will motivate them to act. None of us wants to see them go into the great tribula-

tion. Our people are unified and have their hearts in God's work. I have prepared three sermons, and there are about three or four more to follow, dealing with the seven letters to the seven churches of Asia Minor—with the eras of God's true Church. I feel that there are vital lessons for us to learn from this history, especially for us who are now on the very threshold of God's Kingdom.



Senior citizens were honored at a luncheon where they heard Davy Crockett explain God's perspective on growing older, and each of the 122 attending received a framed souvenir of the Feast containing the words of Proverbs 16:31: "The silver-haired head is a crown of glory if it is found in the way of righteousness."

At the "Blessing of Little Children," eight infants and small children were brought forward to have God's blessing bestowed upon them. Interestingly, three of the infants were brought in from another church group that no longer blesses little children at the Feast.

Brethren enjoyed eating together, participating in recreational activities, and learning to communicate and cooperate despite the challenge of different languages and cultures. A full plate of meaty sermons encouraged all to be watchful and prepare for God's soon-coming Kingdom. Mr. Apartian noted that adaptability is a key to preparing for the Kingdom, and focused on Ruth as an example of a person who changed to became an important person in the physical lineage of Jesus Christ. Mr. Apartian also offered



several new descriptions for the Last Great Day, such as the "Feast of Justice" and the "Feast of the Goodness of God." Other sermons covered such topics as the need to have the heart of a shepherd, the importance of Jerusalem in prophecy, a comparison between today's world and the coming reality of the Kingdom, learning patience and courage from the life of Jeremiah and an exposition of the book of Zephaniah with its pertinent message for the people of God today.

Our visiting minister for the rest of the Feast was Mr. Gary Ullerick with his wife Gail. Mr. Ullerick began his first sermon on Tuesday, showing us "By What Right Does Christ Take Rulership of the Earth?" Mrs. Ullerick sang some beauti-

Port Vila, Vanuatu

Port Vila, the Capital of Vanuatu, again hosted us for the Feast of Tabernacles. Up to 30 people attended and were treated to good, warm weather for the entire Feast. Members live on several different



islands, and travel to Port Vila is expensive (by plane) and arduous (by boat).

At services the brethren were able to view Festival sermon videos supplied by Headquarters, and visiting minister Mr. Kinnear Penman presented several sermons covering the meaning of the Feast of Tabernacles.

We were all able to enjoy a picnic at White Sand Beach. Lunch that day consisted of chickens spit-roasted over a bed of rocks heated in an open fire. We all enjoyed a family fun night. A Bible quiz taxed brethren's knowledge in a fun way and all shared a "pot-luck" banquet.

Pulau Langkawi, Malaysia

Sheer joy and exhilaration were the order of the day when 69 attendees convoked at the Grand Continental Hotel on the island of Langkawi for the opening night videotaped message by Dr. Meredith.

Several brethren from Australia, one from the Philippines and one from Indonesia joined the Malaysian

brethren, making Langkawi a truly international Feast site. Intermittent rains during the Feast were a cause for concern, but the weather failed to dampen the high spirits of the attendees, who proved resourceful enough to counter the interference. Feastgoers had clear weather when it really mattered.

Supplementing the videotaped sermons, local elder and site coordinator Mr. Rajan Moses made significant contributions to the rich and balanced diet of spiritual food that everyone enjoyed.

The Grand Continental Hotel is nestled in a valley and surrounded by lush hills. Most of the facilities were within easy reach of the hotel, some even within walking distance. Numerous activities were lined up to cater to all the various age groups, from a Spokesman Club, to a family day at the beach, to the Talent Night showcasing some of the skills of the brethren, and featuring contributions by overseas visitors as well.

All brethren left their hometown by air-conditioned bus, peacefully and in great pleasure. Brethren made a special prayer for next year's Feast together with brethren from other nations by God's will.

Wadduwa, Sri Lanka

Brethren in Sri Lanka kept the Feast in a beautiful resort down south. We had a total of 45 in attendance, including children. The first night got off to a rough start as one of the senior citizens tripped, fell on her hand and fractured her wrist, and the equipment burned out. But that did not hinder the Feast spirit. Sierra de la Ventana, Argentina

With a peak attendance of 49 enthusiastic people, we celebrated the Feast of Tabernacles and the Last Great Day in one of the most beautiful regions on Earth. After more than six hours of travel from Buenos Aires through the Argentinean *pampas*, where you will not find even the smallest hills, the first mountain formations—that make part of the region's mountain range—begin to appear.

Sierra de la Ventana, a town firmly located in a valley and surrounded by two rivers of crystal clear water, gets its name from a "window" that opens through the top of one of the rocky mountain peaks of this region. The hike to this peak, called "Cerro de la Ventana" (Window Hill), constitutes one of the challenges that the youngsters, up to 62 years of age, were able to achieve after three-and-a-half hours of hiking. With the beauty of this place, such a hike is something that cannot be left undone. The population of this town does not exceed 1,500 and its architecture, weather and picturesque train station reminded us of a place we have all seen in some movie.



Members from Argentina, Chile, Costa Rica, the United States of America and Puerto Rico gathered here for the Festival. Everybody was very satisfied, even though it was a long journey for some. The beauty of this place and the extraordinarily low prices, for both lodging and food, are enough reasons to recommend this site to other brethren who are considering the possibility of attending the Feasts in Argentina in the coming years.

A high point of the Feast was the baptism of Alfredo Carvajal Hidalgo, son of Mr. Sergio Carvajal and Mrs. Audelia Hidalgo de Carvajal, our hosts in Santiago, Chile, who are also faithfully dedicated to the Work of our radio program *El Mundo de Mañana*.

Another interesting note was the attendance to the Feast of Mr. Aldo García, from Santiago, Chile, who began attending services just three months ago. Mr. García is fruit of a new harvest, having been called after listening to Mr. Mario Hernandez on the local radio program.

There are not enough words to express the unity, harmony, camaraderie and true brotherhood that we enjoyed during these days—something truly exemplary. We all left with the gladness of having enjoyed the best of all Feasts.

Barbados

The local brethren were joined by two families from the United States and one from Canada to celebrate the Feast of Tabernacles at the Barbados Beach Club, located on the south coast of the island. Thirty-five attended the opening night service, and attendance increased daily, reaching 50 on the Last Great Day.

Everyone was in high spirits, despite the death of long-serving member Clement Lowe on Friday, September 20, and the visit from tropical storm Lili four days later. Nether the Feast nor the brethren were affected by the storm.

The sermons were stirring and uplifting; Dr. Donald Roach delivered five sermons and conducted the blessing of the children, and Dr. Robert Thiel gave four sermonettes. Activities were well-subscribed and thoroughly enjoyed by all. These included the traditional family day, a dinner-dance, a picnic lunch aboard a catamaran sailing in the Caribbean, and a tour of the world-famous Harrison's Cave and Orchid World, a garden displaying a variety of exotic orchids.

Quetzaltenango, Guatemala

The Feast of Tabernacles returned to Quetzaltenango this year, the second largest and second most important city in Guatemala after the capital. It is called, among other things, "The Cradle of Culture." Its name means "the place of the quetzal." The quetzal is the name of a bird with a long tail, which is found in the country's flag and on its currency, also called the quetzal.

The group of 49 included 41 relatives, including La Crescenta, California deacon Vicente Enriquez, his expectant wife and daughter. The Feast is truly a family affair in more ways than one. Visiting elder Mr. Raul H. Reyes, not physically related, felt related as part of the spiritual family at the Feast.

It rained every day of the Feast, but that did not dampen the enthusiasm of the brethren. Neither did a small earthquake during Dr. Meredith's Last Great Day sermon—which occurred just before Dr. Meredith mentioned earthquakes in his message.

While the waters were coming down outside, God's living water—the Holy Spirit—was evident in the sermons. One subject that rained down on the church for three days was the book of Proverbs. Negril, Jamaica

More than 200 were registered for the Feast; there were 76 local brethren attending, and 125 from overseas. One gentleman (a subscriber to the *Tomorrow's World* magazine) visited with his daughter on the Last Great Day. During the Feast, three people were baptized.

The Oaxtepec Recreational Center has big and beautiful features that can be used for enhancing the Feast of Tabernacles. However, the real Feast atmosphere was built by the brethren who attended, who with true love, zeal for the Work of God and contagious enthusiasm, made this Feast of Tabernacles most fruitful and special for everyone.

The final message of the Feast was "Be Strong and of Good Courage," knowing that each of us would soon resume our routine activities, but filled with the "seed" that we will nourish during the following months, to once again present ourselves before our God at the start of the coming Holy Day season, bearing mature fruits, sweet and bountiful for His praise, glory, honor and thanksgiving.

Tobago

The Feast of Tabernacles 2002 in Tobago was held at the Grafton Beach Resort. "good social life" or any other such reason. As many of you have said: "It was almost like a 'second calling' from God" when you had to sometimes "stand alone" after re-proving the Truth and stepping out of our former association. You had to prove to yourself where Christ was now working, where the full Truth was now being preached, and who was doing the Work of God. I am sure that you have been—and will continue to be—truly blessed for that!

Even so, it is easy to forget that Jesus Christ really is in charge. We may tend to see the "human element" in decisions within the Church. We may even see real or imagined "mistakes" from time to time. Does that mean Christ is not really in charge? Of course not! For Iesus Christ and our heavenly Father allow us, as human beings, to make mistakes—even in serving God. But, as Mr. Herbert Armstrong used to say: "Brethren, Jesus Christ allowed me to make dozens of mistakes over the years. But Christ has never allowed me to make the kind of major mistake that would seriously cripple or destroy the Church!"

Yes, God allows all of us—including His human leadership—to

make mistakes and learn the lessons of life (cf. Galatians 2:11–13). And even Jesus Christ, who neither sinned nor made mistakes, *learned* from His human experience: Your Bible says: "Though He was a Son, yet He learned *obedience* by the things which He **suffered**" (Hebrews 5:8).

As the Living Church of God moves its earthly Headquarters to Charlotte, I fully expect that we will soon begin to do a more powerful work. It is evident to me through many circumstances that Christ is now "positioning" us to enlarge our efforts and finally have a major impact on this sinful world. Truly, brethren, this world needs what we have to give! As we grow and expand, mistakes will be made. Changes will occur-and they will sometimes be misunderstood or disliked by some. As the Church grows, exact jobs and responsibilities of many will change because of different needs in the Work.

Overall, however, Christ will certainly be "in charge." He will be guiding, directing and inspiring us all along the way.

For our part, we must draw ever closer to Him. We must walk and truly "fellowship" with Christ and with our heavenly Father. We must believe in God and trust in Him. As

the Apostle Paul wrote: "But without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of those who diligently seek Him" (Hebrews 11:6). And again: "For He Himself has said, 'I will never leave you nor forsake you" (Hebrews 13:5).

Since Jesus Christ is "the same yesterday, today and forever" (v. 8), we must have confidence that our Head and Savior will directly lead and guide us as He did the early church soon after His death and resurrection. Notice Mark 16:19–20: "So then, after the Lord had spoken to them, He was received up into heaven, and sat down at the right hand of God. And they went out and preached everywhere, the Lord working with them and confirming the word through the accompanying signs. Amen."

Brethren, please meditate on these basic biblical principles. We will *need* to understand them in the months and years that lie ahead of us. May God help all of us to build an even greater degree of *faith* and *confidence* in the leadership of Jesus Christ in His Church today. In the trials and tests that are sure to come, we need to look "beyond" man and see what God is doing in His Church and in His Work today!

I hope and pray that all of you are "ready" for this—willing to trust God to take care of you and give you eternal life, even if some of us have to suffer a premature death in the service of Jesus Christ. Remember Jesus' prophetic commission and warning to His disciples—which applies to us today as it did to His original disciples: "Now brother will deliver up brother to death, and a father his child; and children will rise up against parents and cause them to be put to death. And you will be hated by all for My name's sake. But he who endures to the end will be saved. When they persecute you in this city, flee to another. For assuredly, I say to you, you will not have

gone through the cities of Israel before the Son of Man comes" (Matthew 10:21–23). Again, in this passage, God indicates that we will be hated by "all" for Christ's name's sake. Only those who "endure" to the end will be saved.

We must constantly be drawing closer to God—making God more "real" in our hearts and minds—in order to *faithfully* go through the traumatic years ahead. We must always remember what Jesus told His disciples: "If anyone desires to come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow Me. For whoever desires to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for My sake will find it. For what profit is it to a man if he gains the whole world, and loses his own soul? Or what will a man give in exchange for his soul?" (Matthew 16:24–26).

There is, in all of us, the normal desire to "save" our lives in this world. But Jesus tells us: "Whoever loses His life for My sake will find it" (v. 25). Our constant communion with God—our "fellowship" with God and Christ through profound Bible study, meditation, prayer and fasting—all of this will enable us to focus on God's Kingdom and not be drawn into this world in the selfishness, worldliness and confusion that is rampant throughout our entire society and even among many of God's people today.

As I cited to you in my sermon during the Feast, let us remember the Apostle Paul's admonition: "If then you were raised with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ is, sitting at the right hand of God. Set your mind on things above, not on things on the earth. For you died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is our life appears, then you also will appear with Him in glory" (Colossians 3:1-4). We must indeed "set our minds" on what Christ and the Father are planning up in heaven. We must mentally picture the coming Kingdom, the glorious rule of Christ over a reconstructed world of prosperity, peace and love. We must picture the magnificent opportunity to serve right along with Jesus Christ, in helping millions of human beings reconstruct their own lives and come to know God during the Millennium and the Great White Throne Judgment. These things must become the ultimate reality in our minds and thoughts. For, dear brethren, they are the ultimate reality!

As I explained during the Feast, a number of us may die before the Tribulation begins or Christ returns. For those events may still be a number of years away—and thousands of our members are already in their 60s, 70s and 80s! Remember that King David, the "man after God's own heart," died "old and full of days" even though he was only 70 years of age! And many of us are already beyond the age at which King David died some 3,000 years ago. Yet, even in the next few years, most of us will have the opportunity to genuinely prepare in a positive way for the return of our Savior as King of kings. We will truly be "laying up treasure in heaven" by helping and serving in the very Work which Jesus Christ is doing through His Church today. And, again, by teaching and practicing the correct form of government in the Church—trusting Christ as the living Head of the Church to guide and lead—we will be preparing more than any other group for significant positions of authority, rule and service in Christ's soon-coming government.

So let us continually **pray** for one another. Let us *encourage* one another—and be constantly aware that some may at times become discouraged or downcast as

they grow older, as human weakness and sickness sets in and Christ "still doesn't come" as soon as we, humanly, would like. Yet, if we are truly converted, in our heart of hearts we *know* that this *extra time* may be needed by our other brethren to overcome and grow, and for God to be genuinely sure that conditions are fully "ripe" before He intervenes and brings on the horrifying Great Tribulation. We would not want to press God to "hurry" the Great Tribulation, would we?

Brethren these things are on my mind because of a dear elderly lady in the Church who I learned has recently died. She was a faithful and "gutsy" lady filled with enthusiasm and courage. As I was visiting her a couple of years ago, just before she underwent a serious operation, she told me: "Mr. Meredith, I may not be alive at this time tomorrow afternoon. But let's talk about the resurrection! I am interested in the resurrection and plan to be there! Could we discuss this for a few minutes?" She was focusing on what Paul said. She was setting her mind "on things above, not on things on the earth." All of us need to do this more than we probably now do. For, as the Apostle Paul was inspired to tell us: "If in this life only we have hope in Christ, we are of all men the most pitiable. But now Christ is risen from the dead, and has become the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep" (1 Corinthians 15:19-20).

The genuine hope of all Christians is the *resurrection* of the dead. Let us all plan to do all we possibly can in this life to *prepare* for God's Kingdom, to help others while we have the opportunity, and still prepare *ourselves* mentally, emotionally and spiritually for the resurrection from the dead. If we truly "walk with God" in this way in our thoughts and prayers, God will bless us. We will soon become His full sons in the resurrection. We will—in the resurrection—have the magnificent and exciting opportunity to literally "interact" with Christ and with the Father in planning, preparing and executing wonderful projects on this earth and perhaps later throughout the universe. We will literally "fellowship with the Father and with His Son Jesus Christ" (1 John 1:3).

May God Himself help all of you to catch this vision and to make the Kingdom of God and the Work of God a more vital part of your lives. Then, we will soon be part of the extended family of God and share eternity with Him, with Jesus, and with one another in a Kingdom based on love, joy and peace.



Ominous Weather Ahead

The vast majority of scientists believe that the trend of "global warming" will have serious consequences for humanity. But until recently, politicians were pretty much divided on this subject.

As reported in a *Reuters* news article last June, "the Bush administration acknowledged for the first time in a new report that U.S. greenhouse gas emissions will increase significantly over the next two decades."

When fossil fuels such as gasoline, oil and coal are burned, carbon dioxide is released into the atmosphere. Of course, this is the same gas that we human beings give off when we exhale. All the plants of the earth absorb this same gas and release oxygen as a byproduct. Throughout the entirety of human history, this cycle was in apparent balance—until the past century. Over the last 100 years, as vast tracts of tropical rain forests have had their timber cut, Earth's atmosphere has seen a build-up of carbon dioxide. Compounding this build-up has been the burning of huge quantities of fossil fuels, which has released enormous amounts of this gas that required hundreds of millions of years to be accumulated in the fossil fuels in the first place.

The net effect is what is called the "greenhouse effect." Carbon dioxide in our atmosphere traps heat more effectively than oxygen, and this allows the earth's temperature to climb. As the human population continues to expand, more fossil fuel release of carbon dioxide is inevitable. *Reuters* reported the Bush administration forecast that: "The total U.S. greenhouse gas emissions will increase 43 percent between 2000 and 2020. Average temperatures in the U.S. will rise 5 degrees to 9 degrees during this century. Average sea levels, rising 19 inches from global warming, could

threaten building, roads, power lines and other infrastructure. With a higher sea level, coastal regions could be subject to increased wind and flood damage." These are startling admissions from a White House that had never before acknowledged these effects and mankind's role in them.

Other factors beyond mankind's control—such as the sun's regular cycle of sunspot activity—may also affect weather and the rise in temperature.

There is one other factor that scientists do not take into consideration. The Creator reserves the right to affect weather patterns. The Word of God clearly indicates that God will use the weather patterns to bring us to Him, for our own good. For those nations that obey their Creator, God says in Leviticus 26:4: "I will give you rain in its season and the land will yield its produce."

To the nations that turn their backs on God, He warns: "I will break the pride of your power; I will make your heavens like iron and your earth like bronze" (v. 19). God will get the attention of mankind with weather patterns that produce drought and famine.

When Jesus Christ was asked by His disciples what would be the sign of His coming and the end of the age, He replied: "There will be famines, pestilences and earthquakes in various places" (Matthew 24:7). But whatever the weather patterns that will affect our nation as God begins to withdraw His blessings, we can truly seek God in our own lives—and God promises protection to those who truly seek Him: "A thousand may fall at your side, and ten thousand at your right hand; but it shall not come near you. Only with your eyes shall you look, and see the reward of the wicked" (Psalm 91:7–8).
